**Sam Hunter's Observations On Winter Birds.**

Some evidence of the extremely mild winter, which is being experienced this year, is furnished by the following letter in the Toronto World. Everyone who knows Sam Hunter, and his knowledge of the feathered tribe, will be prepared to admit that he is an authority on the subject. He writes as follows:

Editor World: In answer to W. F. M., I would mention two unusual winter residents observed by me on Christmas Day at Millbrook, Ont. There was a Great Blue Heron (a "crane") and a woodcock, both found about some open spring runs in the vicinity of a large trout stream, running for the most part through cedar swamp or open woodland near to the village. Judging from tracks and other evidence, both birds had been there for many days at least. The "crane" I was informed by two parties, had been seen "fishing" up and down creek all winter. Twice I had observed frogs in open pools as lively as on an April day. The crane and woodcock are birds that usually winter from about Virginia southward. A red-tailed hawk was seen by me Dec. 27th at Millbrook; a robin in South Parkdale, almost daily, since Dec. 17, to the present time.

**Sad Drowning Accident.**

Saturday night a strong gale blew from the south, melting the snow and swelling the creeks and streams into torrents. Mr. Wm. McIvor rising early Sunday morning, accompanied by his son Charles hurried down to Needer's Mill (where both were employed), to find the water running over the Mill bank about a foot deep and the ground below the Mill north to King St. covered with water. This was about 6 a.m. Shortly afterwards Mr. Charles Needer arrived and they succeeded by cutting or otherwise in removing some logs from the waste gate, freeing a mass of water that rushed down stream a seething torrent. About 100 feet below the gate the creek bed rises, from here a reflux current rushed back toward the Mill with almost the force of the main stream. Some logs, caught between the main and reflux current floated, comparatively at rest, and it was in an effort to reach them that the unfortunate young man met his death. Accompanied by his brother Fred, in a canoe they attempted to cross, but were unable to control the boat, as soon as the boat entered the current it upset, Fred being saved with difficulty. It is said that Charles attempted to hold onto the boat but was swept off almost instantly by the icy waters and carried down stream, the body being recovered about an hour afterwards below Collins' Octagon Mill. Charles was but 15 years of age, a modest, manly young fellow and his untimely death is universally deplored. Deep sympathy is felt for the family in their lamentable bereavement.

The funeral on Tuesday from the family residence to the Presbyterian Cemetery was very largely attended, the Rev. Wm. Johnston conducting the services at the house and grave. Among the floral offerings was a wreath from the Presbyterian Sunday School, A basket of flowers from Miss McIvor Peterboro. Shower Boquet from Dr. Needer, Toronto, and Cut Carnations from Mr. Alf Needer.

Besides his parents, four sisters, Mrs. Nelson Douval, of Gorham, N.Y., Mrs. C. Amy, of Pennyang, N.Y., and the Misses Etta and Maud at home, and three brothers, Walter at Gainsboro, N. W. T., George at Cobourg, and Frederick, in town, are left to mourn his loss.
