SEA MONSTERS THAT SINK SHIPS.

Vessels Wrecked by Porpoises, Whales and Sword-Fish.

An extraordinary affair happened the other day in the estuary of the Shannon, Ireland, the yacht *Giant Hen* being captured by a school of giant porpoises, who were blindly pursuing some salmon.

The local papers, in reporting the occurrence, speak of it as unique; but this is not quite so, since no longer ago than July, 1905, the smack *Jeau Roy* was wrecked in a precisely similar fashion while trawling in the North Sea.

Then, of course, there are numerous well-authenticated instances of ships being charged and sunk by whales. Thus, the Danish schooner *Anna* was rammied by a hundred-foot monster in mid-ocean while on a voyage from Iceland to New Brunswick not long since, and had her bows stove in, the crew being rescued in the nick of time by the Liverpool liner *Quermore*.

In this instance, according to the story told by the captain of the *Anna*, there could be no question of accident. The whale, a huge old bull, circled round and round the ship as if chafing at the idea of attacking it, and then suddenly charged it full tilt.

In 1904, again, the schooner *Monaghan* was wrecked by a sword-fish off Block Island, the long-toothed spear ripping open her planking for a space of several feet, so that she foundered almost immediately; while at St. John's, Newfoundland, there is preserved a portion—nineteen feet long—of one of the arms of a gigantic octopus, which, in the year 1873, attacked and sunk one of the fishing fleet there. The monster was killed by the crew of the other boat, and afterwards carefully examined by Dr. M. Harvey, L.D., who estimated its weight at over three tons.

## WORKING LADS' SUCCESS

### BEST POSITIONS IN EDUCATIONAL, SOCIAL AND POLITICAL WORLD.

Many Poor English Boys Have Had Brilliant Careers Through Hard Work and Pluck.

In this country the educational ladder has literally its foot resting in the gutter and its top reaching to the Cabinet of the British Empire, says London Tit-Bits. So many scholarships and other aids are there, indeed, for the poor boy that it has been said of late that it is the rich student who is handicapped in the race, and that the advantage is decidedly on the side of the poor lad.

An ounce of fact is worth a pound of theory, and a few instances will go far to prove that the right way for brains has been secured, and that the race for the highest positions in the educational, social and political world is much nearer being a race where all start from scratch than it used to be, when the key with means had a fifty yards' start in a hundred.

Less than a score of years ago the son of a poor widow at Wakefield won a scholarship which took him to the Grammar School of that town. He worked hard and won prizes galore, finally going to Cambridge with some three or four extremely valuable scholarships to support him there. His career at the 'Varsity was a brilliant success, for he worked like a Trojan and emerged triumphantly with the blue ribbon of the educational world, the Senior Wrangler.

Subsequently a fellowship of his college was conferred upon him, and for some years he acted as a tutor at the University. To-day he is one of the most famous mission preachers of our time, and

### A MAN OF GREAT MARK.

Best of all, his widowed mother is still living at a good old age. Needless to say she rejoices in the success of her boy, and no one will wonder that she should be proud of him.

We will take now an instance from London. There was a boy who, in 1872, won a scholarship from an ordinary Board school to a secondary school. He gained the Carpenter's Foundation and the Conquest Gold Medal. A few years later he obtained the proud position of captain at the City of London School on the Embankment. Going to Cambridge on scholarships, he was a Foundation Scholar at Trinity and later was made a fellow of that renowned college. At the end of his 'Varsity course he resolved to go in for the Civil Service, and passed the necessary examination so well that he was drafted at once into the Board of Trade offices. There his great ability soon made him prominent, and he has been promoted with almost unexampled rapidity, until to-day he stands practically at the head of the permanent officials in that important department of the Government.

In the early eighties a Scottish lad, whose parents had migrated to Liverpool, took a scholarship at one of the ordinary schools which gave him the advantage of secondary education. Subsequently he developed

and carried everything before him in the way of prizes, exhibitions, and scholarships. Under ordinary circumstances his father would have been able to give him only a meagre education, but from the age of ten he never had to spend a penny upon him, and finally he went, with flying colors, to Cambridge. There he did brilliantly and the University and specialized in medicine. For twenty years he has been one of the most famous men at Cambridge, and he is to-day the Principal of one of the greatest Universities in Scotland, a position that, in the widest dreams of his youth, he could scarcely have hoped to attain, and one, certainly, which would have been absolutely impossible of attainment had it not been that the right way for brains is indeed open.

In 1890 a boy in a London elementary school, named Wild, who had won many valuable scholarships as a lad, went to Balliol College, Oxford, entirely on the proceeds of exhibitions and scholarships. He did very well there, and subsequently went in for the Indian Civil Service. Taking a high position on the class list, he went out to our Eastern possessions, and he has risen since until to-day he is at the top of the ladder in his own department, and not only has an excellent position, but
