On Wednesday, January 20th, James Dick Thornton was attended by a great concourse of relatives and friends. Interment took place in the Emily Cemetery. The pall was borne by the deceased four nephews, Messrs David Bech, D. H. Cornell, D. Thornton, David Thornton and by two very intimate friends of the deceased, Messrs John J. Lamb and John Bennett.

The service was conducted by a former Pastor, Rev. Mr. Kannawin, of Strathroy assisted by Revs. Teney and McCulloch. Among the many floral tributes was a wreath of violets from Mrs. Hamilton of Toronto, a bouquet of Carnations from Mrs. McNeillie of Lindsay, an anchor from the Omemee Presbyterian choir. The deceased who was in his 63rd year was born in Emily where he spent his boyhood. He served as a clerk at Centerville, at Port Hope and later became a traveller for a Toronto firm.

After the death of his brother, David, he returned to Omemee where he has since resided. At the age of 18 years, the late Mr. Thornton joined the Presbyterian church at Centerville and actively labored for its interests in choir and Sunday school work. About 18 or 19 years ago in company with Mr. James McLean of Mt. Pleasant, he organized the Omemee Presbyterian Sabbath School on an Easter Sunday. He was a talented musician, and used his great gift unshrinkingly for the benefit of church and of the state.

He was the means of securing many improvements for the Village and Township, latest of which was the cleaning of Pigeon River to the Lake of floating logs so it would be accessible for small draught boats. During his illness, which began in early September, the doctors seemed to think that the druggists' work on the river, under a burning sun, was too much for his constitution and consequently laid him up in a bed of sickness from which he rallied after a week, but was again stricken in November and compelled to again take to bed where he lingered—not without hopes of recovery—till on January 18th a third stroke brought on a dislocation and he sank peacefully away fully trusting in the merciful Providence that had served him well. His face and form will be greatly missed in our village as will his gentle anxiety about the welfare of others and his many qualities which heved him as a Christian gentleman of the highest type.
