1500 CONVERSIONS

Results of Great Religious Meeting in Boston. Boston, Feb. 19.—The Hub is in the middle of what is termed the "greatest religious movement in ecclesiastical history." At one meeting of men on Sunday there were 3,500 present, and Dr. J. Wilbur Chapman had been speaking hardly ten minutes when a wave of religious fervor seemed to strike the audience. Before the hour was over upward of 1,500 conversions had been reported in the audience. Then came a remarkable exhibition. Dr. Chapman asked every man who wanted to lead a better life to stand, and every man in the audience arose. The leader then asked every man who would pledge himself to live as near as possible as Christ would stand. Every man in the audience stood.

WESLEY EVENING.

The Literary Department of the Methodist Epworth League provided a very interesting, profitable and inspiring programme for the large and enthusiastic audience who attended the Wesley Evening on Monday last. The history and times of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, is one of surpassing importance and interest. The Life of Wesley, the famous Spiritual Reformer, who established one of the greatest of Christian denominations, the "Methodist Church," is one of absorbing import to the Universe. The sketch of his life and animating, ennobling qualities were ably rehearsed to the benefit and inspiration of all.

An excellent framed portrait of John Wesley presented by the Literary Department to the Church was unveiled by the Pastor, Rev. Mr. Rogers in a eulogistic address paid eloquent and brilliant tribute to the renowned Scholar and Reformer.

Miss Pearl Burnham gave an excellent paper on Wesley's life which was clear, practical and earnest.

Mr. Harvey Thexton delivered a very logical and inspiring address on Wesley as Class Leader. His paper was one of diligent thought, deliberation and power. Many vital and essential truths were recorded in these instructive and beneficial addresses of the memorial Wesley. Mr. George T. Walsh read a paper on "History of the Father and Mother of Methodism and Home Environment." The immoral, illiteracy of the 18th Century, the religious indolence and impiety, the great revival with the memorable and beneficial results accomplished through the masterful mind, surpassing ability, unparalleled powers of eloquence, or organization and influence of John Wesley and the great evolution of Methodism were distinctly, concisely and fully established in the able and educational papers.

Miss Stella Hetherington admirably recited "The Death of Wesley," showing his triumphant crossing the bar, his inspiration and influence in death as in life.

Hymns, composed by Wesley, voicing the fundamentals of true religion and Methodist Doctrine, were sung throughout the evening. Mr. J. M. Adams, the able Literary Convener, was the efficient chairman. The Literary Department of the League can justly be congratulated on the unique success of this ennobling and animating meeting.

The life of Wesley, a prominent figure in history, the saint and reformer, moulder of the greatest Century in English History, intellectual, spiritual and industrial, was very ably taken from many important standpoints to the advantage of all. The Life of John Wesley is a most inspiring biography.

The Epworth League service of Monday evening will long be remembered as one of intense interest, broad influence and literary importance.

Mr. H. R. Pickup Has Been Appointed to Help Rev. Dr. Gilray with the Work.

Mr. H. R. Pickup, B. A., who is in his last year at Knox College, has been appointed assistant to Rev. Dr. Gilray, pastor of College Street Presbyterian Church, at a salary of \$1000 a year.

Dr. Gilray announced last evening that Mr. Pickup had been chosen unanimously at a joint meeting of managers and session. Dr. Gilray explained that, while Mr. Pickup would do what he could for the present, he would not be able to enter fully upon his duties until April.

Mr. Pickup preached last night, and before commencing his sermon, he said: "I appreciate the honor that has been conferred on me. I realize the responsibilities before me, and if, in my own mind, I have hesitated before accepting the position, it has been because of the magnitude of the work."

Mr. Pickup was educated at the Public School and High School of Millbrook, at Varsity and at Knox. He has had experience of mission work in British Columbia, and is an effective speaker and preacher, earnest and lucid. A brother, Rev. Stanley H. Pickup, is pastor of South Side
