

Prince Rupert.

The above caption is the euphonious and appropriate name which the Grand Trunk Pacific have adopted for their terminus on the Pacific coast. The people of Canada were given an opportunity of naming the city, which some day will become one of the greatest seaports on the Western coast of America; and 1260 different names were submitted by those who took part in the contest. A name has been chosen that is significant of Canada and one that was prominent in the early history of the country, when nearly the entire area of British North America was known as Prince Rupert's Land. Under the terms of the competition the name should contain not more than three syllables, not more than ten letters, the name which complied with the conditions and most nearly resembled that selected was Port Rupert this name being suggested by Mrs John O'Connell, of Bonaventure, Ontario, and by Mr. R. Kirkwood, of Copper Cliff, Ontario. The judges, however, decided that "Prince Rupert" was a more pleasing name and more appropriate, and awarded the two hundred and fifty-dollar prize to Miss Eleanor A. Macdonald, of Winnipeg, Manitoba, who was the only one who submitted this name. The Grand Trunk Pacific, however, recognizing the spirit of the contest awarded the same amount to each of the two contestants who submitted the name Port Rupert.

But why Prince Rupert? What had the dashing young cavalry leader of the cavaliers nearly three hundred years ago to do with Canada? Prince Rupert was really the first British Canadian business magnate. He was a promoter of the Hudson's Bay Company, and its first Governor, in 1670. In that year Charles II granted a charter to the Prince and seventeen other noblemen and gentlemen, incorporating them as "The Governor and Company of Adventurers of England, trading into Hudson's Bay," and securing to them "the sole trade and commerce of all those seas and straits, bays, rivers, lakes, creeks and sounds in whatever latitude they shall be, that lie within the entrance of the Straits commonly called Hudson's Straits, together with all the lands and territories upon the countries, coasts and confines of the seas, bays, etc., aforesaid, that were not already actually possessed by or granted to any of our subjects, or possessed by the subjects of any other Christian Prince or State. The first settlements of the country thus granted, which was to be known as Rupert's Land were made on James Bay and at Churchill and Hoyle's River.

Prince Rupert was born in 1619, the son of Frederick V., Elector-palatine and Elizabeth, eldest daughter of James I of England. He was a man of impetuous bravery, but at the same time showed deep caution. When only 12 years old he took part in the siege of Rheimsberg, and at the age of 18 commanded a regiment of cavalry in active service. At the beginning of the civil war he was placed at the head of a regiment of horse and took part in several battles. Notwithstanding a serious error at Marston Moor, he was soon appointed commander of all the Royal troops. After the defeat of Naseby, on June 14, 1645, he retired to Bristol, but surrendered that city on August 22. The King thereupon deprived him of his commission. In 1648 he was, for want of any competent man appointed to command the fleet. He was blockaded by Blake in Kinsale Harbor, but in October, 1649, forced his way out and steered for Lisbon. Blake pursued him and he was only saved by assistance from the King of Portugal. He subsequently escaped to the West Indies, but after the restoration of Charles II, he was made a Privy Councillor, and served under the Duke of York against the Dutch. He was afterwards Governor of Windsor Castle, where, during the last nine years of his life he devoted himself to scientific and artistic pursuits. He died November 29, 1682.

LOCAL OPTION For South Monaghan.

To Prohibit the Sale of Liquor in the Township of South Monaghan.

The Municipal Council of the Township of South Monaghan hereby enacts as follows:
I. That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every Tavern, Inn, or other place of public entertainment in the said Municipality, and the sale thereof, except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place in the said Municipality other than a house of public entertainment.

II. That the vote of the electors of the said Township of South Monaghan will be taken on the By-Law by the deputy returning officers hereinafter named, on Monday, the 26th day of March, one thousand nine hundred and six, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon at the under-mentioned places.

Rolling sub-division Number One, Council Chamber, Centreville, Joseph Lang, Deputy Returning Officer.

Rolling sub-division Number Two, Sunday School Hall, Bensford, Wilbert Wood, Deputy Returning Officer.

III. That on the 24th day of March A.D. 1906, at his office in the Township of South Monaghan at the hour of eight o'clock in the forenoon the Receiver shall appoint in writing, signed by himself, two persons to attend the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this By-Law and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-Law.

IV. That the Clerk of the said Municipal Council of the Township of South Monaghan shall attend at his office at the hour of six o'clock in the afternoon, on the 26th day of March, A.D. 1906, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-Law.

V. This By-Law shall come into operation, and be of full force and effect, on and after the first day of May next, after the final passing thereof.

Electric Power Necessary.

What a Bank President and Largest Manufacturer Says.

Mr W F Cowan, of Oshawa, principal proprietor of the Malabar Works, and of the Oshawa Steam Gas Fittings Co., also President of Standard Bank of Canada, and President of the Western Bank, Oshawa, in addressing the reorganizing meeting of the board of Trade, reported as follows:—Said that in electing officers it would be well to select men who were conversant with the rail companies, as the great work for the Board of Trade would be to secure better freight rates for our manufacturers. Other work would be the securing of new industries. It is manufacturing that makes our town and if we get outsiders to come in we will be to grow them here ourselves. One thing we greatly lack is electric power and the speaker hoped to see brought to Oshawa from Burlington as was proposed by the Central Ontario Power Co. Competition in manufacturing is very keen and new concerns are starting in business every day, and it is therefore important that we should do all in our power to attract and protect our manufacturing concerns. Manufacturing industries benefit the town and he was willing to do what he could to induce others to come here. He referred to the responsibility resting on manufacturers and said there are now \$2000 a paid in this town in wages to work men in our factories. Anything that can be done to bring the business together in a united effort to benefit town he considered a good scheme and he hoped to see a successful Board of Trade in Oshawa this year."
