CAVAN COUNCIL. Council Chamber, Cavan, Wednesday, March 14, 1906. The Council met at 11 o'clock a.m. this day pursuant to adjournment.

Members all present. The Reeve presiding. The minutes of the last meeting were read, approved and signed. The following communications were read: From the Dominion Securities Corporation, Toronto, respecting Debentures for sale.

From the National Sanitarium Association or Free Hospital for Consumption, acknowledging receipt of \$5.00 towards that institution from Cavan Council. From Johnston Murphy, asking rebate on taxes on account of less through fire.

From Clerk of N. Monaghan, acknowledging receipt of balance on boundary account. From Secretary of Bureau of Industries, Toronto, respecting Butter and Cheese factories in Cavan. Communications were left on table.

On motion John Ward was heard respecting taxes for two dogs and about a wire fence. Mr. Ward was referred to Court of Revision later on about his dogs. James Hunter was heard respecting petition re dog-tax.

Coun. Shield reported that he instructed Albert Rutherford to open the 14th concession Swamp east of Mount Pleasant to cut underbrush and fix bridges. Our Solicitor, Mr. Raddy, was heard respecting the Long Swamp Drainage By-law.

James H. McGill presented a petition to have his farm the east quarter lot 23, Con. 4, changed from S. Sec. No. 14 to S. Sec. No. 21 as it would be more convenient for his children to go to the latter school. Mr. McGill's petition was received and after looking into the statutes, it was moved by Coun. Kelly; see by Coun. Reynolds, that the Clerk be instructed in accordance with the Statutes to notify the Trustees of S. Section No. 14 and 21 respecting the alterations petitioned for. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Kelly, see by Coun. Shield, that a deputation from N. Monaghan Council viz, Reeve Madill and Coun. Brown, be heard respecting re Long Swamp Drain. Carried. They said that in accordance with their expense in said drain, they should have an extra drain dug on the boundary. The Council said that it was too late now to take any action respecting this extra drain.

Coun. Shield introduced a By-law to appoint Fence-Viewers, Pound Keepers and Overseers of the Highway in the Township of Cavan for the current year. This By-law passed through its several stages and was signed and sealed appointing the following officers for the current year: FENCE VIEWERS. R. J.
