## Hades Spoken of in Testament.

Rev. Dr. W. D. Armstrong's Sermon in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church.

Rev. Dr. W. D. Armstrong delivered a splendid sermon on the "Intermediate State" in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church last evening. He stated that the use of the term "hell" in the Creed was misleading as it was mentioned as hades in the Bible. In the New Testament hades is spoken of eleven times and does not mean the ordinary conception of hell. Christ when He left His body on the cross went to hades, which was the abode of departed spirits to whom He preached the Gospel. This certainly was not hell. There are many children who are dying have not reached the age of religious knowledge; there are newly converted people who depart this life before they have become thoroughly in practice with the religion, and must all these be condemned to hell, in our conception of the word? We may appeal to the Bible, to our reason and to the experience of this church and thus construct our own conception of the intermediate life. We may conceive that it is a place of purification and development for the departed spirits. We may conclude that the point where development will be downward, or we may conceive of a reflection of this one. We may conceive that much good may be developed there which was not brought forward here; sermons which were preached here, prayers which were offered here, may be the sources of development of good there. Again, we may believe that a reciprocal relation of spirits may exist there and may be in relation with life here.

But, from the works of God and His methods which we find in Scripture and see in development in this life, we may believe with sincerity that He is not idle in the Intermediate State.

In conclusion Rev. Dr. Armstrong stated that it was clearly our duty to accept the Saviour now and in so doing obtain the right to the revelation of the Saviour there. It is certain that this is the day of our opportunity here and these opportunities will not be provided there to those who reject them in this life.—The Ottawa Valley Journal.

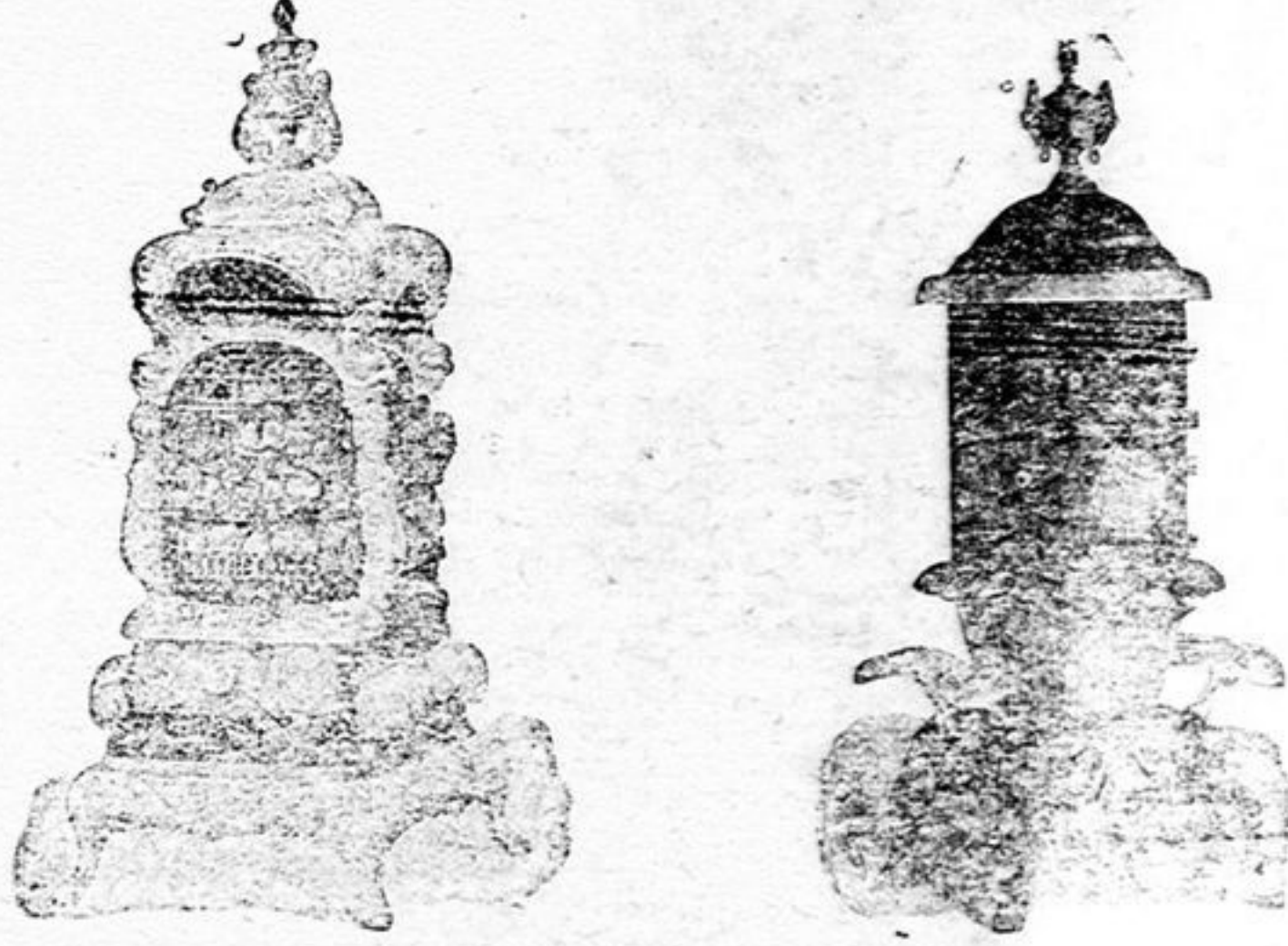
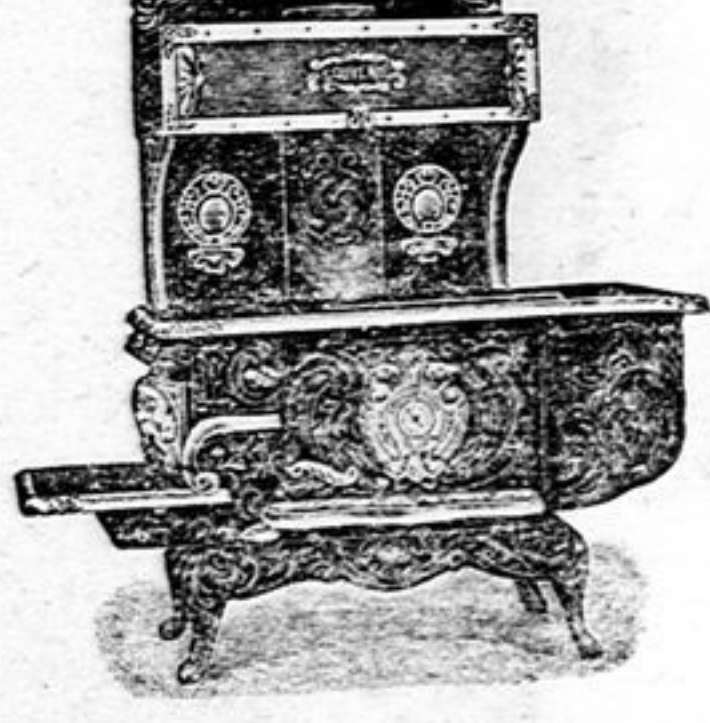
