The following resolution was passed at the last meeting of the Hope Township Council:

Moved by Coun. L. H. Cann, sec. by Coun. S. R. Caldwell, that the Municipal Council of the Township of Hope, in session assembled, desire to convey to Mr. J. J. Preston, Member for the East Riding of Durham, their thanks for his active and able efforts in assisting the Township of Hope in securing a grant of \$2,800 from the Ontario Government to help in the payment of the expenditure incurred in the purchase of the Hope Toll Roads, and further that the Reeve and Clerk be and is hereby authorized to sign this resolution and affix the corporate seal thereto and forward a copy to Mr. Preston.
