The bride was attired in white silk and the bridesmaid in plaid silk, both looking charming. The bride, who is quite popular among her many friends, received many beautiful presents.

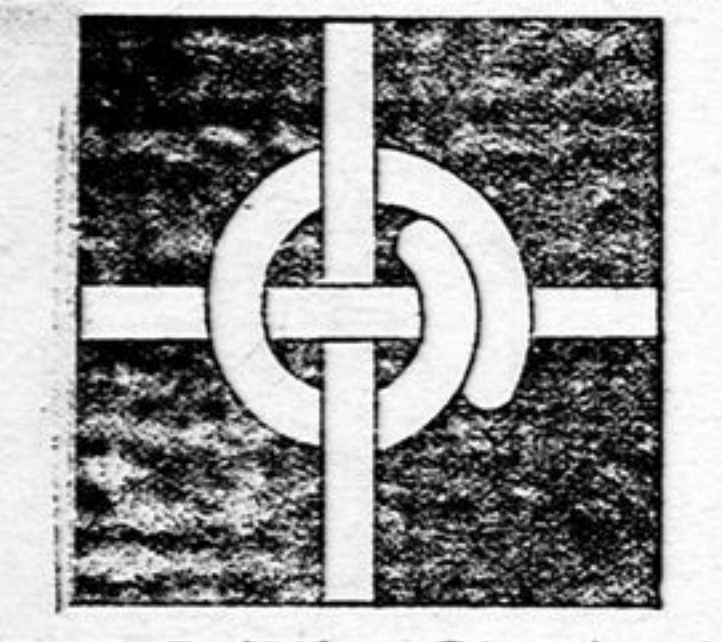

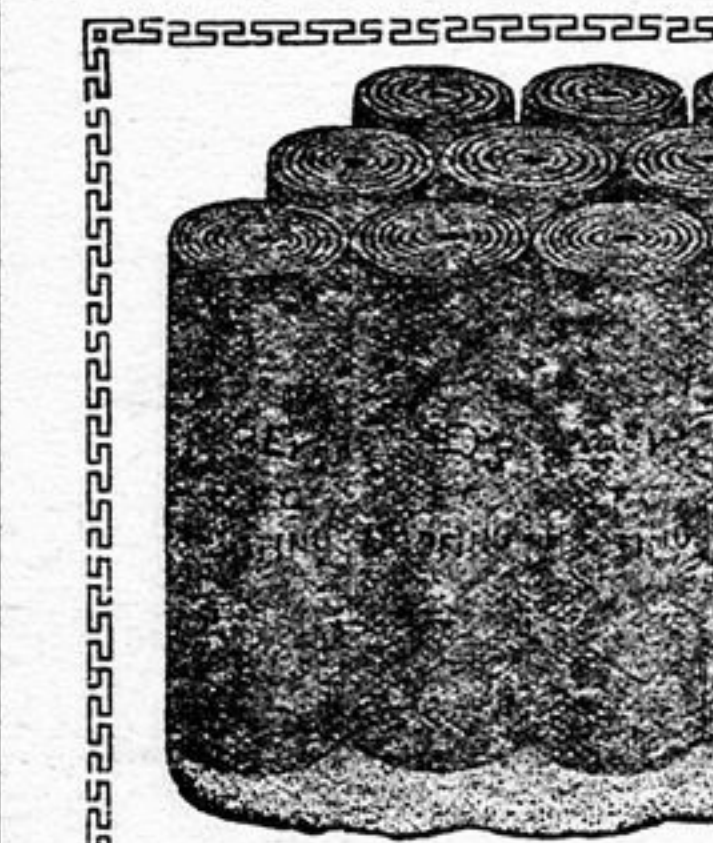
