CHEESE FROWNED ON IN JAPAN.
Even Japanese Rats Won't Eat It—A Lobster is a Nice Birthday Gift.

Japanese who is not of the high color or ultra European cult would not think of eating a ripe Camembert cheese than we would think of giving a broiled lobster to a friend for a birthday or New Year's gift. Yet the people who call cheese "rotten milk" find decorative and symbolic attributes in the humble crustacean that has become a word of reproach in the Western world. Because there are no cows in Japan except those kept near the foreign settlements to supply Europeans and Americans, there was no cheese in Japan until that delicacy came in with the white resident. The Japanese, being introduced to cheese for the first time with the advent of the French restaurant in Yokohama and the foreign style Imperial Hotel in Tokio, appraised it with elemental directness. It smelled bad and was unfit food.

"We eat daikon, which smells somewhat strongly," a Japanese student of the Imperial University once said, "but the smell is natural; it is part of the daikon. Your foreign cheese smells of decay; it is not cheese until it has decayed. I don't think it is proper to eat decayed things."
So imbred seems the Japanese antipathy to cheese that the rats in chrysanthemum land will not touch it. Foreign housewives in Yokohama say that when they open a tin of Denmark cheese they have no need to cover it again, for the rats will run right over the can and track the bag of rice next on the pantry shelf.

The rats, it would seem, have never tasted cheese and do not care to try.

The lobster, on the other hand, is a popular emblem of long life with the Japanese. To give one to a friend on his birthday or at New Year's means that the donor wishes that he may live so long that he may become doubled over the lobster.

Sometimes a boiled lobster is hung up with the pine boughs that are used to decorate the houses on New Year's Day, but more often it is a more abiding lobster made of cotton and scarlet cloth that has the place of honor over the door lintel.

TIGER HUNT IN COREA.

How Javanese Guard Against Mameaters—Cave Tiger of Amoy.

"The tiger," said George Robertson of Scotland, who has had many exciting experiences in hunting tigers in Far Eastern countries, "is usually looked on as a tropical beast, but as a matter of fact he is found pretty much throughout the continent of Asia. He is an animal of great power, resource and intelligence and exerts a large influence on the lives of the people."
"In Corea, where I have hunted, there are no forests on the seaboard, but the inland ridges are heavily timbered, and here the tigers are found. The beasts are numerous and are pursued on foot. After two or three vain chases I was told by the natives that no tigers could be found unless a sacrifice were offered, and accordingly I gave up some coin for the necessary rice and wine. The sacrifice was accordingly made, and the next day I shot a very handsome specimen. In every Corean village there is an official hornblower, whose duty it is to sound his horn whenever a tiger gets into a village at night. The natives are sorely afraid of them, and many a human life is annually destroyed by the savage beasts."

"In the province of Amoy I ran across the cave tigers. The land is bare of woods or brush, and the tigers live in long tunnels in the rocks. The Chinese hunt them with torches, carrying three-pronged spears, and the boys who go on these dangerous expeditions proceed with as much coolness as the average youth in this country does in a rabbit hunt. A tiger, however, will not charge a light, but woe to the hunter whose light goes out."
"In Java there are more tigers than anywhere I have hunted. In some places the brute were so numerous that the inhabitants slept in houses built on piles, so as to be protected from their assaults. The Javanese hold them in such awe that many of the natives abstain even from using the name of the beast."

QUEER TREE FROG OF BRAZIL.
The man who did a wailing dog after frogs has found a new frog. This frog is an inhabitant of the dense Amazonian forest region, and is well known to the Indians, who say that they often hear its loud voice calling for its mate in the moonlight. But although Mr. E. A. Goeldi, director of the Para Museum, Brazil, and others have spent many years in the vicinity of its haunts, only quite recently this frog was discovered to be a stranger to frog science. Its breeding habits are most extraordinary. The breeding ground is chosen in the high trees where depressions or holes occur in the branches. These depressions are lined with a resinous substance which is collected by the frog as it drops from the bark of certain trees. They are made watertight and soon get filled with the rain. In this water the frog lays its eggs, and there the young, when hatched, remain during their entire tadpolehood. This new frog is yellowish green with particles of brown on the body and bands of the same color across the limbs. It is one of the largest known tree frogs.

WEALTH UNDER THE SEA

THE AFRICAN COAST IS LINED WITH BULLION.

Expedition Leaves London to Search for Wrecked Treasure in Many Places.
There is a fascinating air of romance and adventure about the expedition which left the East India docks the other day in the steamer Alfred Nobel, to search for sunken treasure worth \$30,000,000 off the coast of Africa.

According to Captain C. A. P. Gardiner, who heads the expedition, the African coast is lined with bullion sunk in every kind of vessel, from old Dutch galleons to modern liners. Here is an alluring list of a few of the treasures which, it is hoped, will be brought to the surface:

WHAT THEY SEEK.
Immensely rich treasure captured from pirates and sunk in the Wilhelm der Secunda.
Priceless china, bullion, tin, lead and silver, sunk in the Dutch galleon Middleburg, which was scuttled off Hojette Bay 192 years ago, to avoid capture.
Valuable cargo lost in the Dutch Government's armed merchantman Crazenstein in 1658.
Copper, tin and silver of great value, which went down in the Aberdeen White Star boat Thermopylae.

Captain Gardiner has served in the British and Chinese navies, and is an officer of the Royal Navy Reserve. His attention was drawn to the records of the many wrecks which have occurred along the African coasts, and he spent several years in endeavoring to locate them.

He was rewarded by the discovery of 29 wrecks which could be reached and the result of his discoveries was the formation of the South African Salvage Company, Limited, with a capital of \$125,000.

WELL-EQUIPPED SHIP.
The steamer Alfred Nobel, once the Oromea, a pleasure yacht, and more recently engaged in carrying dynamite, was chartered, and neither pains nor money was spared in equipping her as a salvage vessel.

There will be 20 hands, including two divers, all ex-navy or naval reserve men. They will sign on for five years, and will be given a 5 per cent. share of all treasure found.
The Cape Government claims 15 per cent. of the value of all silver raised, 25 per cent. of the value of gold and precious stones, and 10 per cent. of the value of other articles, but Captain Gardiner is quite satisfied that there will be enough left to please everybody concerned.

Place in Constantinople Where Beggars are Maimed to Excite Pity.
In no other city in the world will you see more helpless cripples than in Constantinople. Sitting all the day on the parapets that shield the edge of the Galata Bridge from the waters of the Golden Horn are beggars—men, women, and children—most of them the victims to some dreadful malady, all of them waiting out their piteous cry for alms.

And look at that man there. His right shoulder is bare, so that all may see he has no arm. Yet from the shoulder there protrude three fingers—a ghastly freak indeed; yet somehow it is not the ghastliness of the distortion that strikes you so much as wonder that such a thing could possibly be.

And as you pass along the bridge, as you notice the various forms of mutilation and disease that are flaunted before your eyes so brutally, you will be bound to ask yourself the question: Whence comes this dreadful army of the maimed, the halt, the blind, the lame? How can it be that there are so many "freaks"? For that is the only word that sums up the lamentable regiment.

Neither is it easy to learn the truth of things in Constantinople. Yet a traveler in Turkey a little while ago discovered quite by chance a fact that made his blood run cold, that has opened the eyes of philanthropists to the existence of horrors that seemed at first blush beyond credence.

It was this: Outside Constantinople, hidden away in one of those beautiful gorges that few Britishers penetrate, there exists a cripple factory, a place where freaks are manufactured—if the word will pass—where cripples are created that they may be sent forth into the streets of Constantinople to beg, to acquire money for the enrichment of the vile directors of the hideous scheme.

Those fingers protruding from the shoulder of the deformed beggar on the bridge, the sightless eyes of the little girl, the legless man who whines up to your face, that being who was apparently burnt in a dreadful manner—all are fakes, or rather—for their deformities are genuine enough, poor souls!—all owe their ailments to the fiendish ingenuity of the cripple manufacturers. Suggest such a thing as this to anyone in authority in Constantinople and you will probably be laughed at. Yet there can be little doubt as to the reality of the dreadful truth.
