The Late W. T. Grandy.

There passed away at the family residence, Millbrook, on Wednesday, April 29th, one of Millbrook's most highly respected citizens, in the person of W. T. Grandy, second son of the late Thos. Grandy, after a few weeks illness. He contracted a severe cold last March, and notwithstanding the best efforts of medical skill, he passed peacefully away on Wednesday of last week. He was born at Indian Point in Bexley township, but has resided in Millbrook the greater part of his life. He was educated in the Millbrook Public School, but at an early age he started to clerk in Kells, Fowler & Co's store, and in the year 1900 he clerked for Mr. Scott, Millbrook, and also for Scougall Bros., of Colborne. He then returned to Millbrook and went into partnership with Mr. Scott, and in 1903 bought Mr. Scott's interest in the business, which he has since conducted up to the time of his death.

Will was esteemed for his many noble traits of character. He was upright and honest in all his dealings, true to his friends, and was always anxious to do what he considered fair and just towards his fellow beings.

The funeral on Friday to the Cemetery on the 9th line of Cavan was very largely attended, his Brethren of the Masonic Order turning out in a body, headed by the Citizens Band. The Rev. H. A. Ben-Oiel conducted the services of the Church of England; and Messrs. A. A. Smith and J. C. Kells conducted the Masonic services at the house and grave.
