MR. LANGFELDT'S LECTURE.

A lecture was delivered by Rev. E. A. Langfeldt, B. D., of St. Luke's, Peterboro, in Christ Church, Omeme under the auspices of the Girl's Guild, on Friday evening last.

The Rev. J. H. Teney, the Rector, occupied the chair, and introduced the lecturer in fitting terms. The title of the lecture was, "The Evolution of a Boy"; but it would be hard to define the subject by any appropriate descriptive phrase. The incidents that formed the occasion for Mr. Langfeldt's humor ranged all the way from the trials and tribulations of Adam under the very disadvantageous circumstances under which he was placed in raising his boy to the vicissitudes in the life of a modern boy from the cradle to the grave. And there was not an incident in that strange, eventful history that did not afford Mr. Langfeldt an opportunity for the most with provoking humor or the most heart-touching pathos. Then, too, the quality of his humor is original and unique, and because of this, all the more irresistible. There were passages in the lecture that perhaps reminded one of certain features in one or other of the great American humorists; but Mr. Langfeldt's humor does not consist in unconscionable exaggeration—which seems to be the chief characteristic of American humor—nor does it consist in belittling and degrading sublime and holy things, or events, as is the manner of some Yankee humorists. If it has any kinship with any modern humor, it is to that of Mr. Jerome's as shown by his "Three Men in a Boat." It is the humor of incident and emotion. It is founded on the affection and a profound sympathy for human nature, and thus consists in seeing with a sympathetic eye the laughable side of the various incidents in our daily life. As it does not contain a particle of ill-nature, sarcasm is excluded; thus it does leave in the mouth a bitter taste such as the irony that Dean Swift gives us. Thus it is that Mr. Langfeldt is able to give his hearers an hour and a half of pure enjoyment, such as one gets from a Comedy by Oliver Goldsmith. It has been the privilege of the Mirror to listen to lectures by most of American humorists; but from none of them was derived more pure, fine and unalloyed pleasure than that afforded by Mr. Langfeldt's lecture.
