BOARD OF EDUCATION.

DEAR SIR,—

The Toronto teachers, especially those who formerly lived in Durham County, are glad to learn that the teachers of Durham County propose to come to Toronto on the 24th and 25th inst. to hold the Public Schools Convention, and the Toronto teachers have made arrangements to give a reception to the Durham teachers on Friday evening, 25th inst., but unfortunately the railway tickets are not good on Saturday, so that the Durham teachers will have to leave about five o'clock.

As a partial guide to the teachers of Durham I send the following general outline of the present plan. Inspector Tilley will send a detailed statement to all teachers:—

Those teachers who can make it convenient to come to Toronto on Wednesday evening, 23rd inst., could take advantage of the Public School Children's Concert in Massey Hall. Reserved seats 25c.

Thursday, the 24th, to be spent in sight seeing.

At 8 p. m., on Thursday the Convention will assemble in the Public Hall of the Normal School, when short addresses will be delivered by Principal Scott of the Normal School, Chief Inspector Hughes, Dr. Goggin, Professor Squar, Rev. Dr. Talling and J. J. Tilley, all of whom were formerly teachers in Durham County.

On Friday morning all the teachers will assemble at the City Hall at 8.30, where they will be divided into groups to visit the various schools. Inspector Hughes will have guides to take the teachers to the schools.

In the afternoon the teachers will visit Queen Alexandra School, the last school erected in Toronto, and will visit the different rooms, especially the Domestic Science and Manual Training rooms.

Teachers will be free at 2.30 to make preparatory arrangements for leaving on the early evening train. The exact time of leaving will be announced at the City Hall on Friday morning. All teachers should bring their valises to the City Hall on Friday morning, so as to make it unnecessary to return to their home to get their luggage.

A committee will meet the morning train on Thursday, and the evening train on Wednesday, if notice has been given that some of the Durham teachers are coming on Wednesday evening, for the purpose of giving information in regard to good boarding houses and hotel accommodations to those who have no friends in the city. All teachers who wish information regarding homes should report in the ladies' waiting room upstairs at the Union Station on their arrival.
