We may well think that one who lived so exemplarily a life approached its close "unsustained and soothed by an unflinching trust, as one who wraps the drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams."

In the death of Wm. Turner is removed one of our oldest and best respected citizens. His death occurred on Monday, May 21st, at his late residence, King St., after quite a long illness. His first wife was Miss Lang, of Centreville, to this union two sons and four daughters were born. Some years after his wife's death he married Miss Ann Hutchinson, who also predeceased him. Several years since he married Miss Fanny Smith, who survives him. To her and other bereaved relatives the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended. The funeral took place on Wednesday to the Presbyterian Cemetery and was largely attended.
