To the Epworth League and S. S. Workers of the Methodist Church Throughout the Peterborough, Lindsay & Cannington Districts, and Adjoining Territory of the Bay of Quinte Conference.

Have you heard of it? The Kawartha Lakes Summer School to be held at Bobcaygeon, June 26th to July 2nd inclusive. At a meeting of representatives, workers from the above districts, it was unanimously decided to undertake it. It is hoped that in the future the Sch. will include all the territory of the western part of the Bay of Quinte Conference.

The object of the Summer School is to promote the interests of Sunday school and Epworth League work, with special emphasis upon the study of the bible and missions. This will occupy the morning and evening sessions of each week day. The afternoon will be given over to various forms of recreation, such as excursions, boating, fishing, tennis, basketball, baseball, and many other healthful sports. In the morning early paper meeting; in the forenoon clear, casual and interesting expositions of bible themes and methods of Sunday School and Epworth League work by specialists; in the afternoon all manner of healthful outdoor amusements, and water; in the evening inspiring addresses on vital topics. Added to this is the delightful associations with the workers throughout these districts, the tent life in camp for a week, and the exceptional scenery of the famous Kawartha Lakes region.

One can have all this for a week for an individual outlay of about \$5. Surely one cannot have a week's holiday, and be so much benefited in body and mind, and be so well equipped to return home and lend help and inspiration to our League and Sunday School work any other place for so small an outlay. The estimated outlay of \$5.00 will include everything, such as board and lodging, travelling expenses and a nominal tuition fee to help defray the expenses incurred in holding the school in the local water lines, etc., are giving special reduced travelling rates.

It is expected that a leading feature of the Summer School life will be a colony of tents to be hired at reasonable rates, each League or School or Circuit joining together to hire a tent. 
