Mr. H. A. Morgan spent a few days last week in the village, the guest of A. E. Bryson and E. S. Morgan.

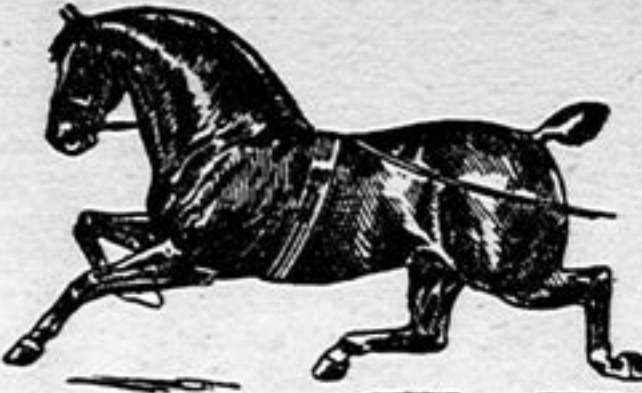
Mrs. Henderson and young son took their departure last week for their new home in Kenora. Their many friends wish her and her husband success in the west.

By invitation of the Village Council a large number of the citizens convened in the Bradburn Hall Wednesday night last, to consider the advisability of lighting the town by electricity. With Mr. G. Balfour in the chair, the Reeve explained the purpose of the meeting, then laid before the ratepayers, (a) the cost of lighting by lamps, which lighting in the past was always very unsatisfactory, (b) the cost by electricity, which, though somewhat more expensive, would be more desirable and efficient. Mr. T. Stephenson was then called on to explain his scheme of lighting which would cost the town about \$300 and provide them with 30 incandescent lamps to be placed along the streets as determined by the Council. Then followed several short, business-like addresses, out of which grew a motion advising the Council to proceed at once with the new work.

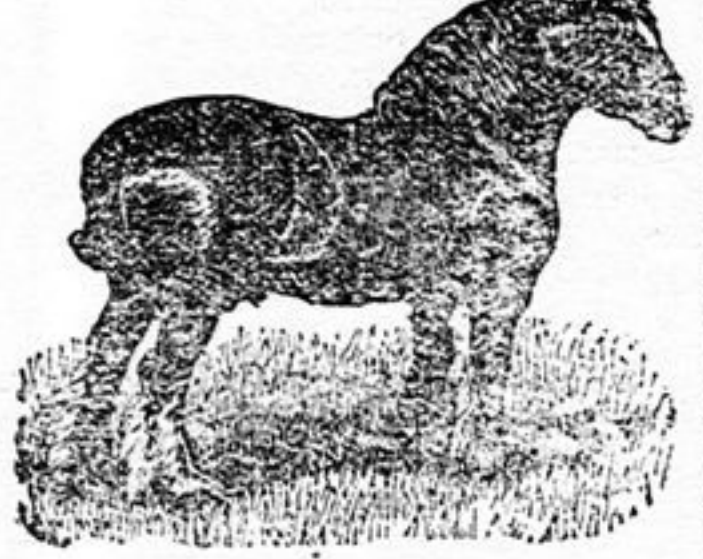

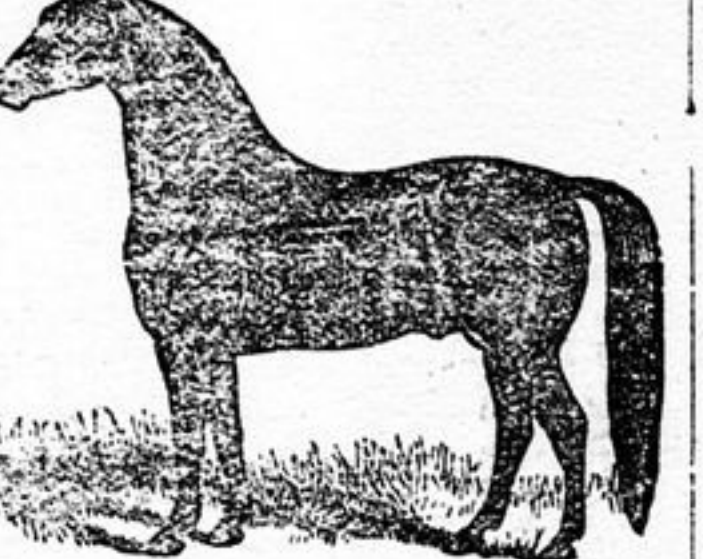
