BY-LAW No. 341.

By-Law to Regulate the Closing of certain shops in this Municipality

Passed May 6th, 1907. Under Ontario Shop Regulating Act of 1888.

Whereas, application has been made to this Council to pass a By-law in accordance with the Ontario Shop Regulating Act of 1888, to have certain shops closed at the hour of ELEVEN o'clock p.m., on Saturdays.

And whereas the said application is signed on behalf of the Dry Goods Class by Walsh & Clarke, Kells, Fowler & Co., W. H. Byam & Son; on behalf of the Grocer Class by R. T. Adams, Geo. F. Burnham, W. H. Coombe; on behalf of the Boot & Shoe Class by T. J. Lang, Wm. Archer, Kells, Fowler & Co.; on behalf of the Jewellers Class by John Steele; on behalf of the Furniture Class by W. J. E. Gillott, W. W. Gillott; on behalf of the Blacksmiths Class by Wm. Rowland, J. Walton, H. Campbell and W. D. Nugent.

And whereas the said application contains three fourths of the whole number engaged and doing business in each of the above mentioned classes respectively, in this Municipality.

Therefore, be it enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Millbrook, and it is hereby enacted:

That all occupiers of shops in this Municipality engaged in and doing business in the heretofore mentioned business classes, viz:—Dry Goods Groceries, Boots & Shoes, Jewellers, Furniture Dealers and Blacksmiths, or the occupiers of any Shop in which two or more trades or classes are carried on, shall if the principal trade being carried on belongs to any of the above mentioned classes, close their respective shops at the hour of ELEVEN O'CLOCK P.M., on each SATURDAY of the year, and remain closed continuously until Monday morning following.

2nd. That any person guilty of an infraction of this By-law shall be summoned before the Reeve or Justice having jurisdiction, and if convicted of the charge preferred shall be fined in the sum of not less than Ten Dollars and not more than Twenty Dollars and costs, if not paid at such time as the convicting Justice shall direct, the same shall be levied by distress and sale of the offenders goods and chattels, and in default of such goods and chattels being found, He or She shall be committed to the common Gaol of the United Counties of Northumberland & Durham for a period not less than Five Days and not more than Ten Days.

Unless such fine and costs and the costs of conveying such convicted person to such Gaol be sooner paid.

This By-law shall come into force on the eighteenth day of May instant.

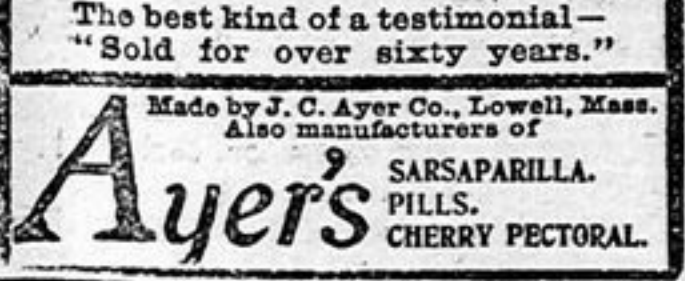

The weather is now quite favorable for vegetation and farmers are nearly through seeding.

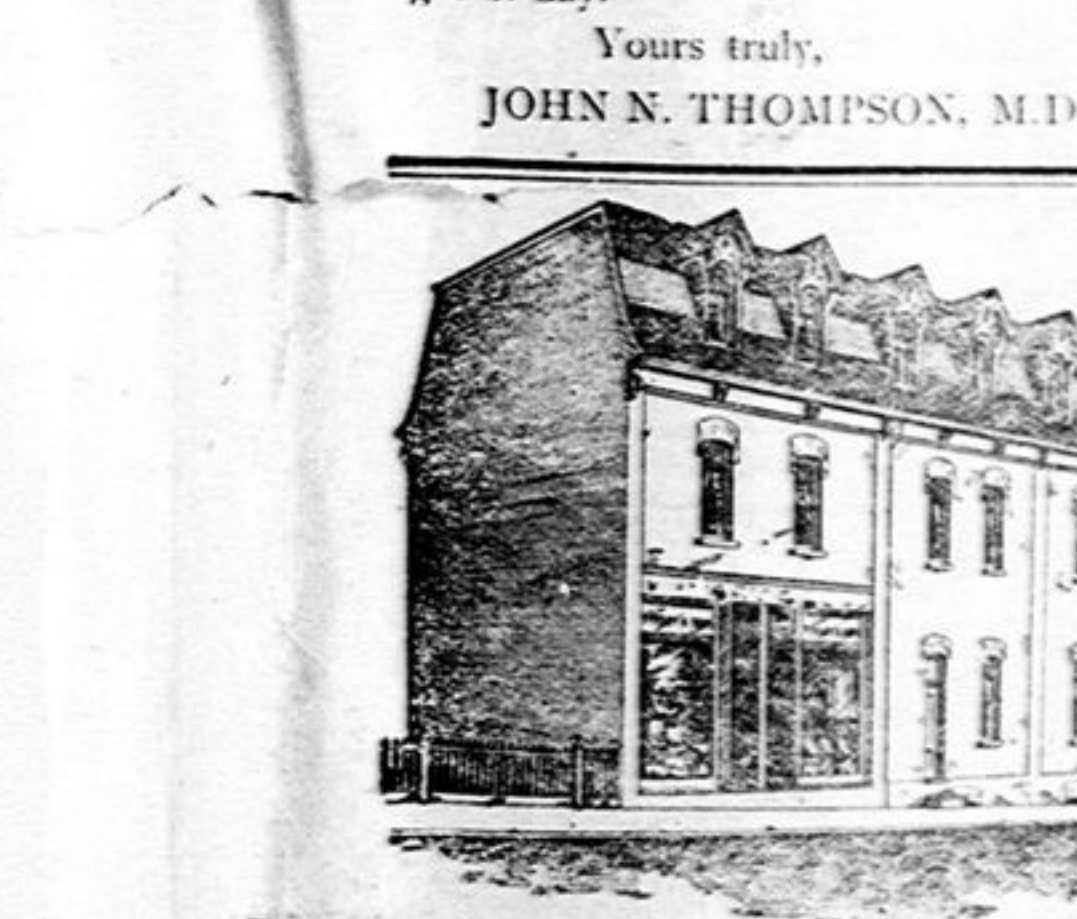
The new stock yards are proving very favorable for loading stock.
