Another Veteran Gone to Rest.

Another pioneer of the mission field of Ontario has answered the call of his Master.
Rev. Richard Homan Harris, B.A., whose death occurred at his home in Swansea on May 8th, 1908, was born in Cork, Ireland, on October 15th, 1829, and at an unusually early age showed a decided aptitude for study. He received his education mainly at an academy in Rosscarbery, Co. Cork, where at the age of 14 years he qualified for the senior Matriculation at Dublin University. He engaged in tuition mainly at the above academy until 1851, when he came to Canada, whither his parents and their family had preceded him. After a brief sojourn in Montreal and Sorel, he came to Upper Canada and engaged in High School teaching, co-working with the late Bishop Strachan in the development of his system of Grammar Schools, as then designated. He entered Trinity College Toronto, in 1857, and, as both the Bishop and the University authorities recognized his fitness for Arts graduation at that time, he was allowed to take a double course in Arts and Theology, graduating in each in 1860, and taking a "Double First" in the course of his Arts Career, winning both the "Welfington" and the "Waddington" scholarships at one examination, and electing to take the former. The late Bishop Baldwin was his dissuade, and they were lifelong friends.

After ordination, though offered a position on the teaching staff of Trinity University, and afterwards a parish in the western field, where he labored industriously for North Ontario, he came from Cambridge as a centre in East Canada, and was also in Omemece, Brighton and Weston, from which he superintended on account of ill health, residing thereafter in Toronto and Swansea, Ontario.

Mr. Harris' first married Colmette, daughter of the late Captain de Grass, of Montreal, who, when she died, left him two daughters, the younger, Colmette, being now a missionary in Egypt. He afterwards married Olivia Coulter, daughter of Wm. Cottingham of Omemece, with whom he leaves two sons and one daughter. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. Richard Natter of Owen Sound, and a brother, Rev. J. H. Harris of Toronto. His remains were interred in St. James' Cemetery, Orillia, on the 11th inst.

Teachers and Farmers to Visit the

Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.
On Thursday, June 4th, the Farmer's Institutes and Educational Association of Victoria County will conduct a two days excursion to Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. This is an opportunity of which a great many people are sure to avail themselves, as the rate is exceedingly low and there are many features of interest in connection with the College and the Provincial Experimental Farm.

In the first place the O. A. C. has a world-wide reputation as is evidenced by the fact that students are in attendance from the United States, Jamaica, Argentine Republic, British Honduras, Spain, Belgium, England, Ireland, Scotland, Malta, India, Japan and several other countries, as well as from every Province in the Dominion. Many tourists from foreign countries visit the College annually, and there is not an Agricultural College on the North American continent that has not an O. A. C. graduate on its staff. The Macdonald Institute, a part of the College is the best equipped school of Domestic Science in the whole of Canada. Here classes of girls may be seen conducting household duties according to the most approved, modern scientific methods.

The Macdonald Consolidated School, the only consolidated school in Ontario stands at the front of the College Campus. The various sections make up one district and the children are taken to and from school night and morning in covered vans. This affords a graded school in a rural district and admits of better qualification and better paid teachers. The extensive gardens are conducted by the teachers and pupils at this school.

On the farm may be seen the various breeds of the different classes of farm animals. The acres of land, comprising over two thousand plots, are used for experimental purposes alone. In connection with this department all the known varieties of farm crops are raised. A good beginning in plant breeding has also been made in recent years. The large green houses used in connection with the culture of flowers and vegetables are points of great interest to visitors, as are also the museum in the Biological department.
The Poultry and Dairy departments are models of excellence and have many attractions for even the most disinterested sight seer.
As this is the annual convention of the teachers of the county every teacher will no doubt be in attendance. The trip is largely an educational one and parents will do well to patronize it and have their children accompany them. There are many features which make a lasting impression on the child's mind. Arrangements have been made whereby a party of boys and girls will be shown around the departments of interest to the young by some member of the college faculty should they so desire it. It has been especially provided for that every professor will be at his post ready to make the visit as profitable and enjoyable for the visitors as possible.
A special Grand Trunk train will leave Omemece at 8:30 a.m. Tickets will be good to return on any regular train on Friday or Friday. The return fare from Omemece is \$2.00, and proportionately low rate from every other station in the county have been secured.
