CAMP COOKERY.

Mrs. Alice Clintenden gives in the NEW IDEA WOMAN'S MAGAZINE for July a number of suggestions for solving the problem of serving sufficient meals in camp without breaking too much into the housekeeper's holiday. "For you must not," she says, "start with the delusion that there is no work to be done." She advises a vegetarian diet, to avoid flies and unpleasant odors with the exception of a few ragouts and the morning bacon; and gives a number of "modified Spanish dishes," which she avers she has found take the place of meat. Some of these are Vegetables with Peppers, Vegetables with Cheese, Vegetable Soup and Black Bean Soup. Although avoiding canned goods as much as possible, the writer would make use of "certain brands of canned clams and others of salmon which are excellent when one wants to prepare a hearty dish with little trouble." In regard to breads, she recommends making it in camp, unless it can be bought from some farmer's wife, though she would limit to such kinds as require no kneading such as graham bread and corn bread. "Spices is not," she says in closing, "a tall of the variety which you can have if you will be content with one dish at a meal. If vegetables are fresh and plentiful, a huge dish of new potatoes and peas boiled together, and seasoned with butter, cream, salt and pepper, is always acceptable. Do not try to make fancy salads or to concoct 'made dishes.' Let all cooking be of granite, which is easily kept clean, and be resigned to let the out-sides of all vessels used on top of the stove get blackened with wood smoke. When you are ready to break up camp, soak them over night in a large boiler filled with a strong solution of washing soda; bring to a boil in the morning and ten minutes work will give you bright ware again."

Council Chamber, Cavan, Friday, June 1st, 1906.

The members of the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Cavan, met in the Council Chamber in the Town Hall, Millbrook, at 10 o'clock a. m. This day pursuant to Public Notice given, as a Court of Revision for hearing and determining appeals against the Assessment Roll for the said Township of Cavan for the year 1906.

Present: Charles McNeill, Esquire, Reeve, and Councillors Kelly, Shaw, Shield and Reynolds.

The members having duly made and subscribed the required oath before the Clerk, the Court was declared open for business.

The Reeve presiding and the Township Clerk of the said Court.

The Clerk presented the following appeals:

Wm. J. Jones, Self. A assessed too high.

Mrs. Sarah McClung, Self. Assessed for two dogs, one of them is dead.

Myles Hutchinson, Self. Assessed for two dogs, one of them is dead.

N. S. Dunlop, C. P. R. Assessed too high.

Re William J. Jones. Complainant after hearing. Moved by Coun. Kelly, see by Coun. Shield. That W. J. Jones' assessment be sustained.—Carried.

Re Mrs. Sarah McClung's complaint. As no person appeared to deal the complaint it was laid over for a while.

Re Myles Hutchinson's complaint, after it was heard it was moved by Coun. Kelly, see by Coun. Reynolds, that Myles Hutchinson's dog which he has destroyed be struck off the Roll.—Carried.

Re C. P. R. complaint, as no person appeared on behalf of the complainant it was moved by Coun. Kelly, see by Coun. Reynolds, that the assessment of the C. P. R. Co. be sustained.—Carried.

Moved by Coun. Kelly, see by Coun. Reynolds, that the Assessor be allowed to make necessary changes in the Roll and additions to it.—Carried.

John Boyd appealed against the assessment of a dog he had given away.

Moved by Coun. Shield, see by Coun. Reynolds, that John Boyd's dog be struck off the Roll.—Carried.

Moved by Coun. Reynolds, see by Coun. Kelly, that Mrs. Sara McClung's dog that is dead be struck off the Roll.—Carried.

Moved by Coun. Reynolds, see by Coun. Kelly, that the Court adjourn until 4 o'clock p. m. for the Council to go into Council Business.—Carried.

The Court resumed again at 4:30 o'clock p. m.

Wm. H. Wood, Jr., was heard about a dog he had destroyed. Moved by Coun. Kelly, see by Coun. Reynolds, that one of W. H. Wood's dogs be struck off the Roll.—Carried.

James E. Fallis was heard about one of his dogs that was dead. Moved by Coun. Shield, see by Coun. Reynolds, that James E. Fallis have one dog struck off the Roll.—Carried.

During the afternoon session of the Court Dr. H. A. Turner appeared on behalf of the C. P. R. Co. but no change was made. Moved by Councillor Kelly, see by Councillor Reynolds, that the Assessment Roll as now revised be the Roll for the Township of Cavan for the year 1906 and that the Clerk do certify the same as being passed.—Carried.

The Court adjourned sine die.
