One can well imagine how embarrassing and how very trying it must have been for two young and inexperienced to undertake the charge of such a gathering. When Mrs. H. arose to give out a hymn (the one mentioned above) she noticed in the audience a young man whom she had never seen before. His countenance was fair and very beautiful. When the hymn had been given out a tune was struck which only Mrs. H. and this young stranger knew, and they sang the hymn through together. At the close of the singing they all knelt and this unknown person engaged in prayer. His words, and manner of utterance, produced a strange and very marked effect upon all present. "Oh," said Mrs. H., "I never, never heard such a prayer. It seemed to pray straight up into heaven. When the prayer was ended and they arose from their knees, every face was bathed in tears.
