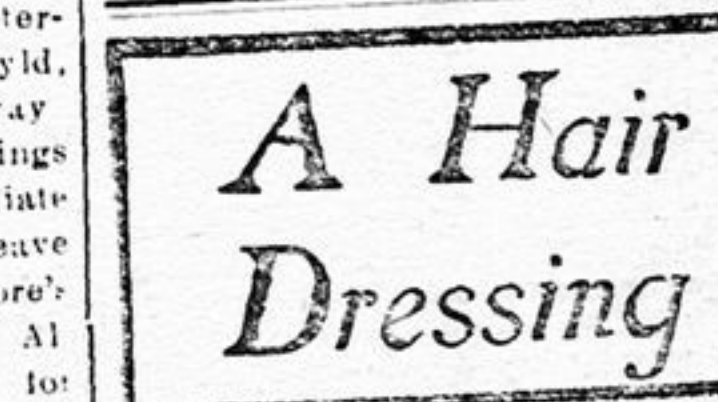

Another Souria pioneer has crossed the great divide in the person of Mr. Christopher Brandon, who died at his home in the Riverview district on Monday, May 27th, at the age of seventy-five years. He was buried in Glenwood cemetery on Wednesday afternoon and was followed to his last resting place by a large funeral train of friends and neighbors. Mr. Brandon was a man of upright and justice of life and action, and highly esteemed by all who knew him. 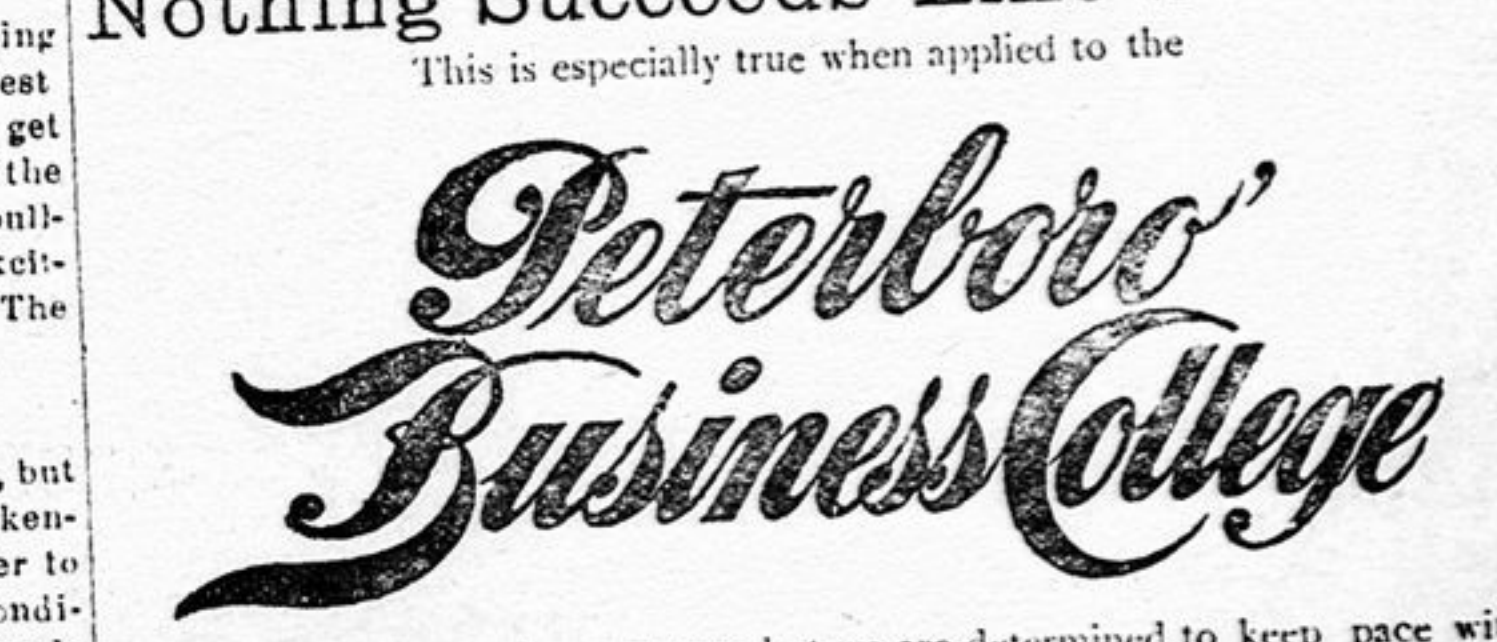

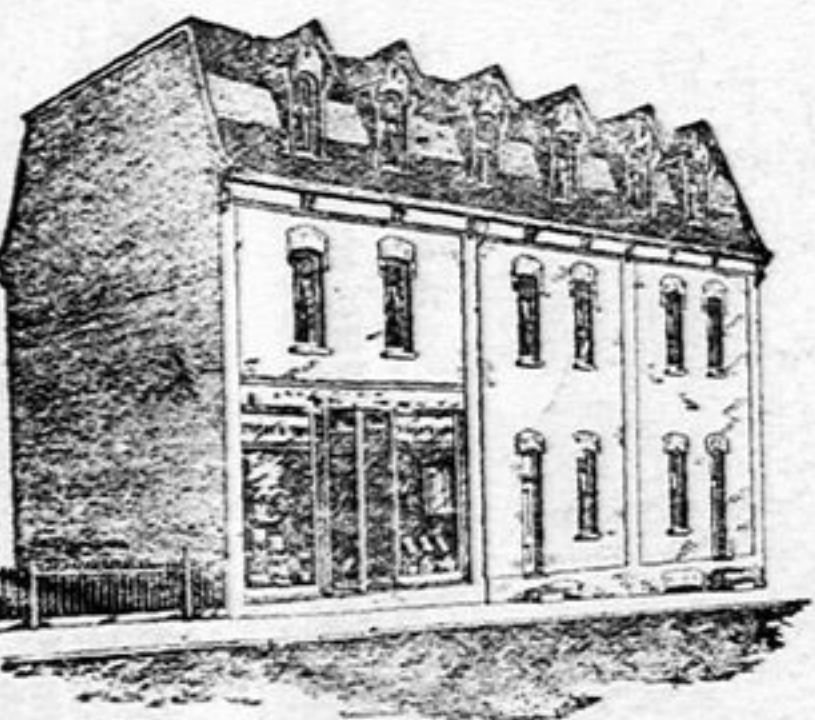
