Last week Mr. Griffin, reeve of Omemees, and Mr. Jos. Beatty, president of the Omemees Board of Trade, were in Ottawa before the Railway Commission in regard to the changing of the Omemees G.T.R. station, which it is desired to bring down to the village.

It was evident that the case would not go in favor of the G.T.R. The matter was deferred until Sept. 14, before which time the G.T.R. promised to make an amicable arrangement that would be satisfactory to Omemees.

Returns After Thirty Years.

After an absence of thirty years Mr. George Henderson, now of Caledonia, N.Y., and formerly of Lindsay and Omemees paid a visit to this town on Saturday last.

During an interim of thirty years this town as can well be imagined, has experienced a considerable number of changes, and Mr. Henderson was at sea for a while when he first walked up Kent St. on Saturday last. A native Omemees, Mr. Henderson came to Lindsay when he was a young man and worked for a time with T. O. While in Omemees, Mr. Henderson was an enthusiastic cricket player, and in the course of conversation with a Warbler reporter, related reminiscences of experience on the cricket crease in games when Lindsay and Omemees were wont to have hard tussles. During one game Mr. Henderson batted out 87 runs, thereby winning for the Lindsay eleven.

On his return to Omemees Mr. Henderson could recall but two faces of his many former schoolmates and associates. One of these was Mr. Sam English, now a man well advanced in years—Watchman-Warder.
