Large congregations, especially in the evening, greeted Mr. Weeks, to whom he expounded able discourses. In the morning he briefly referred to his former residence here some 20 years ago, and was glad to have the privilege of visiting the town again and renewing old acquaintances. His address on "Citizenship" showed a deep and careful study of the comprehensive subject embodying the vital problem in the colonization of our fair Dominion. "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's." The privileges enjoyed by the British subjects greatly exceeded those of a Roman citizen. The duties we should render to our country in return for such bountiful favors, were presented clearly and forcibly. At the evening session he addressed his hearers on "Character," his text being, "Whoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." The bad seeds sown in early life reaps a full and perilous harvest. Evil thoughts and actions culminate in crime, degradation and sin. With effect he classified the varieties of seed, the forms of sin, which develops into wickedness. Habit exerts influence, detrimental or beneficial. The good seeds reap a profitable, bountiful harvest. Good acts and fine traits of character flower in righteousness. His discourse was practical, character building, helpful. Mr. Weeks, in a deep, clear voice, sang "Where's my wandering boy to-night," with the greatest of volume, harmony, and earnestness, and which delighted everyone. Miss Ethel Richardson sang "Eternity waits," most acceptably. Mr. Weeks addressed the S. S. in the afternoon, and favored those present with a splendid solo.
