Miss Winne Bennett has returned to Toronto, after a few weeks' visit with her sister, Mrs. J. A. Wylie.

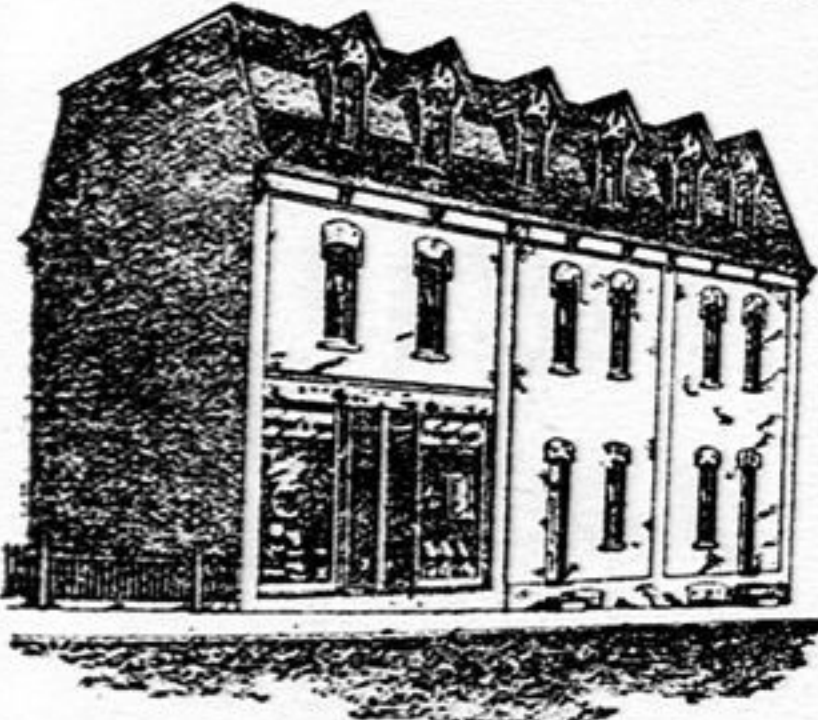
