The Late Mrs. Wm. Mulligan.

Victoria Mitchell, wife of William Mulligan died in Omeme on Tuesday July 16th, 1907. She was the youngest daughter of the late Samuel Mitchell, of Emily, and was 69 years of age. But two members of this family survive, Mr. Samuel Mitchell, of Cramahe and Mrs. Richard Connell, of Emily. Mrs. Mulligan was married on the 15th of July, 1857, to her now sorrowing husband, and if her health had permitted, intended to celebrate their golden wedding this year. For their last four years she has been an invalid, and three weeks before her death she came very much worse, gradually sinking, till death claimed her. She leaves beside her husband five sons, R. J. of Omeme, H. J. of Rochester, N. Y., Geo. W. of Peterboro and Dr. J. W. and H. W. of Fort Coulonge, Que., and one daughter, Mrs. G. G. Adams of Lindsay, six children predeceased her. Mrs. Mulligan was a lifelong Methodist, a devoted christian, faithful in the performance of her duties, and a friend to every good work. The funeral took place on Thursday morning at 10 a.m., the service being conducted by the Rev. R. M. Cull, with Rev. J. H. Teney reading the Scriptures. The deceased having lived all her life in this village and vicinity, a large number of people showed their sympathy and respect by attending the funeral.

Fee, That the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to advise the authorities of the Nicholls Hospital, that owing to the fact that the man Cellars struck by a train on the Grand Trunk Railway and delivered by said Railway to said Hospital was a stranger of migratory disposition and not in any way a resident of this Municipality, this Council cannot see that the Municipality is liable for the account rendered.—Carried.
