Annual S.S. Convention Held at Janetville a Success.
The annual convention of the Sunday School Association of the Township of Manvers, was held in the Methodist church here on Tuesday 7th inst.

The weather was not very favorable and not so many were present as otherwise would have been, but both afternoon and evening meetings seemed to be permeated with an atmosphere of enthusiasm and good cheer. The good cheer could hardly be absent in Mr. Snowden's church, as he is always enjoying life, and makes it his business that others shall do likewise.

Mr. Jakeman, President of the Association, was present. Dr. Marsh and Rev. Ms. Adams unfortunately could not come.

The first item taken up was a general discussion of Sunday School difficulties. Mr. Snodden mentioned that at one of his appointments (Mt. Horeb) he had three services in succession in the afternoon, and the other services somewhat interfered with the Sunday School.

Mr. Richardson thought his greatest difficulty was in the irregular attendance of the teachers.

Mr. Jakeman suggested reserve teachers as a remedy for this difficulty and mentioned his own experience as a reserve teacher. In 27 Sundays out of 28 he never wanted a class.

It was thankfully acknowledged that a good proportion of the children of Manvers were receiving Sunday School instruction, and that good work was being done.

Mr. Clarke, of Millbrook, President of the Provincial Association, was present, and made some remarks of what an ideal teacher should be. He should be called of God, divinely called to the work, not entirely upon his own initiative. He should be present 52 Sundays in the year, not 51. A mere headache or toothache or something else was no excuse for being absent, he must be sick in bed. He might as well split wood on Sundays as be absent from his class without a legitimate excuse.

Mr. Jakeman thought it would be very difficult to get Mr. Clarke's type of teacher.

The other subject discussed was a course of study for teachers. It was decided to invite the provincial organizer of teacher training classes to visit the schools of the township.

Mr. Snowden severely denounced Sunday visiting.

Mr. Clarke's round table conference then held, and the urgency of observing and preparing for it by prayer and personal interest was strongly dwelt upon. In the evening very interesting addresses were given by Mr. Gomm, Mr. Chapman, Mr. Snowden, and Mr. Clarke.

Miss Heatle, of Pontypool, rendered two solos very acceptably.

Mr. W. A. Jakeman was unanimously re-elected as President; Mr. J. Fei Vice Pres; Mr. J. J. Clarke, Sec., and Mr. Eber Preston, Treasurer.
