The Late John James Mitchell.

In the death of Mr. John J. Mitchell, at his late residence in the village of Omeme, on Sunday a.m., the 30th ult., one more of the old and much respected residents of this vicinity has passed away. The late Mr. Mitchell was born in the Township of Emily about 71 years ago, and continuously resided in the said Township up to a little over a year ago when he retired from farming and removed to the village of Omeme. He entered public life in January 1873, when he was elected to the position of Councilor for the Township of Emily, and subsequently to the position of Deputy-Reeve which respective official positions he occupied at intervals until the year 1897, when he retired from public life, carrying with him the respect and confidence of his colleagues, together with the esteem and confidence of all with whom he had come in official contact. His sterling upright and steadfast character, coupled with his gentle manner, gained him the esteem and confidence of his neighbors, which fact was evidenced by the frequent calls for his always ready services in the matter of smoothing over local misunderstandings and consequent frictions. In politics he was a lifelong and ardent Conservative. In religion a consistent member of the Methodist Church. He leaves surviving him, his wife Ruth Mitchell, (nee Milburn), one son, J. Wesley Mitchell, druggist of Toronto, and two daughters, Mrs. Walter J. Boyd of Alameda, Assa and Mrs. David Belch of Mt. Horeb, Ont., his surviving brothers and sisters being Josiah of Peterboro, Thomas A. of Omeme, Mrs. W. H. Hill of Chicago, Mrs. Robt. Johnston of Virden, Man., Mrs. Richard Medd of Cavan, Mrs. H. Moore of Otonabee, and Mrs. S. Newman of Fenelon Falls. The funeral on Tuesday, to the Emily Cemetery, was largely attended. The bereaved relatives have the heartfelt sympathy of their many friends.

A SAD CASE.

The following letter addressed to the Secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, Toronto, from the Rectory, Newwood, Ont., is signed by Rev. J. McKee McLennan, a well-known Anglican minister of the province, needs no comment of ours. It reads: "I desire to secure the admission into the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Gravenhurst of a young woman, a member of my parish. The case is a very sad one, and if help can be given, a promising life can be saved. Three years ago the mother died of consumption. Since that time it has been my painful duty to bury two of the sons with the same disease. Now Annie, aged about sixteen, and a boy of fourteen, are all that remain of the family. The poor girl has been in Muskoka, boarding at a private home, waiting to be admitted. She returned home last week, and within forty-four hours of her return her father dropped dead in his buggy while driving into Newwood. The case is surely one that must appeal to the sympathies of everyone, and yet I fear, only one of the many that are constantly coming under your notice."

The Hospital had last year in its beds and out-patient department 761 patients, 207 of these were from 101 towns outside of Toronto.

The cost is 93 cents per patient per day, and there were 120 sick little ones a day in the Hospital.
