**Death of Mr. George Wilson.**

**Veteran Editor of the Guide Dead After Brief Illness—A Prominent Citizen.**

The death occurred on Saturday of Mr. Geo. Wilson, editor-in-chief of the Port Hope Guide. Mr. Wilson was 80 years of age and had during his whole life enjoyed excellent health until last month when he was seized with the illness of which he died. He came to Canada when seven years of age and lived with his parents in York, now Toronto. In 1837 he went to Markham, and in 1847 married Sarah Howell, who died in 1894, by whom he had eight children. He left Markham for Port Dover, where he published the "New Dominion." After living in Hamilton and Milton Mr. Wilson in 1874 came to Port Hope, where he purchased the Guide, of which, until his death, he was editor. In 1890 he married his second wife, Melissa Murney, of Picton, who died on July 26th last. Mr. Wilson's children, all but one of whom survive him, are Charlotte E. (Mrs. Reid) Charles A. (of the North Ender Co., Toronto) S. Frank (of the Wilson publishing Co., Toronto) Florence M. (at home) George H. (of "The Post") Lindsay Fredric William, (of "The Guide," Port Hope) S. Carrie A. (Mrs. G. A. Andrus, deceased) E. Ella (Mrs. H. Hamly, Toronto).

Mr. Wilson was one of the most prominent citizens of Port Hope. He was a staunch liberal and was one of the leading members of the Methodist church, being a trustee and class leader. He was a justice of the peace, an issuer of marriage licenses and a member of the Public School Board, and of various fraternal societies.

His friends will be found all over the world, for he remembered the injunction—"A man that hath friends must show himself friendly," for he naturally of a genial, friendly disposition and remembered the faces of those he met, and was ever ready to forget a grievance and overlook a fault.

Converted under the ministry of the Rev. Samuel Belton in the winter of 1841-2, he joined the Methodist church and remained a member until his death.

The funeral took place Monday afternoon from his old home, Walton street. The Rev. G. W. Henderson, pastor of the Methodist church, conducted a brief, simple service and many old friends came for a last look at the familiar face.

The learners were his four sons: Charles A., S. Frank, George H., and E. William, son-in-law H. T. Hamly, and grandson V. Bruce Wilson.

Many kind letters and telegrams of sympathy were received from distant friends who could not be present.

The Trustee Board of the Methodist church and the Public School Board, each sent wreaths to decorate the casket of a departed member. Flowers were also received from private sources.

Interment was made in the family plot in the Union Cemetery.
