

Death of Mr. George Wilson.

Veteran Editor of the Guide Dead After Brief Illness-A Prominent Citizen.

The death occurred on Saturday of Mr. Geo. Wilson, editor-in-chief of the Port Hope Guide. Mr. Wilson was 80 years of age and had during his whole life enjoyed excellent health until last month when he was seized with the illness of which he died. He came to Canada when seven years of age and lived with his parents in York, now Toronto. In 1833 he went to Markham, and in 1847 married Sarah Howell, who died in 1894, by whom he had eight children. He left Markham for Port Dover, where he published the "New Dominion." After living in Hamilton and Milton Mr. Wilson in 1874 came to Port Hope, where he purchased the Guide, of which, until his death, he was editor In 1890 he married his second wife, Melissa Murney, of Picton, who died on July 26th last.
