Special and Interesting Services in the Churches on Sunday.

The services in the Millbrook Methodist Church last Sunday were interesting and appropriate.

Mrs. (Rev. Dr.) Chown, of Toronto, also sang at both services. Her selections were: at the morning service "The Man of Galilee" and in the evening "I'm a Pilgrim."

Mrs. Chown has a voice of extraordinary richness and power, and making her singing most impressive.

The following is a short synopsis of Rev. Mr. Clare's discourses: MORNING.

TEXT—Heb. 9:22—And almost all things are by the law purged with blood; and without shedding of blood is no remission.

1st—The greatness of sin in God's sight is revealed by the sins that were or were not atoned for by the sacrificial system.

2nd—The peace offering sealed a trespass against man.

3rd—Burnt offering was a general atonement for the people.

4th—Sin offering atoned for sins of ignorance of people.

5th—But wilful sin or conscious disobedience had no atonement provided by the sacrificial system.

6th—This sin was the great burden of the prophets, who, like David, Job and Isaiah, sought for reconciliation with God after commission of such sins.

7th—For this the only means of reconciliation is in a broken and a contrite heart—not in sacrifices.

8th—Second—Jesus Christ came to teach men the means of reconciliation to God.

9th—In this He used the Old Testament symbols to teach His followers:

(1) The shedding of blood is not the means of reconciliation, but the symbol of the means of reconciliation.

(2) It is only when a man gives up his life in sacrifice or service to realize an ideal, that he obtains the means of the realization of the ideal.

(3) This world, whether considered physically, mentally, morally or religiously, is only raised up by the vicarious suffering of the innocent.

(4) It is only in the giving up of life that we may hope to lift up fallen humanity.

(5) We may not die as martyrs, but live lives of sacrifice far more noble, and beneficial, and worthy of a reward far greater than those of the martyrs, who, for a few moments while the world was
