THE OLD VICTORIA.

Mr Robert Shaw since purchasing the Victoria Hotel property and moving to the village, has improved the place very much, and, under his management it is steadily becoming more desirable as a residence and more valuable as a place of business. The brick structure, substantially built, but for some years neglected, had been thoroughly renovated from cellar to garret, and Mr. Ben McMahon has shown how a good painter and paper-hanger can transform dingy and smoke grimed apartments into new taste-furnished ones. Mr. J. Shaw is now having the old building on the west side of the yard, from the stable to the gateway, pulled down, to make room for a new driving shed, etc. Mr. Arthur McMahon is doing the work and no doubt will evolve a creditable struggle from the debris. This old building was formerly the 'Victoria Hotel', was built in the 'fifties' when much inside the village limits of to-day was unoccupied; the business of the town was largely located on Tupper St., from King northward and merchandise was hauled on wagons from Port Hope. The industries of the village consisted of blacksmith and cooper shops, two tanneries, a potash factory, brewery, grist and woollen mills, and two distilleries doing a thriving business. The principal institutions were the Spring and Fall Fairs, and the celebration of 'The Glorious Twelfth' kept up from the first of June to the beginning of August. To the May Fair farmers and others brought cattle, sheep and pigs, buyers attended from Kingston and other points, and when business was over it was customary to have a jolly time. But the November Fair was the occasion for genuine pleasure and whole-souled enjoyment, 'The Man on Horseback' came from Clarke, Manvers, Cavan, Monaghan and Hope, and Donnybrook transplanted and improved kept possession of the streets from noon to midnight and after. Next morning ownerless horses strayed on the commons and horseless owners trudged home through the mud, to settle down to work and prepare for the next November fair. The old house saw much of fun and jollity in those days, municipal campaigns were planned in the little room behind the bar, many grateful guests were sheltered beneath its roof, and its enticing beverages were responsible for much trouble and bickering. While the disappearance of the old 'land mark' can not be regretted, we may feel tolerably sure that the sound sense and business ability of the present owner will gradually make the property more useful and more valuable than in the past.

Peterboro Cheese Board.

Wednesday, Aug. 2.

At this morning's meeting of the Peterboro Cheese Board, 5149 boxes were boarded and sold, the ruling price being 10 7-8 cents, which is considerably higher than that obtained at any previous meeting of the Board this year.

Mr. Whittou got the majority of the cheese, his purchases amounting to about 3800 boxes, for which he paid 10 7-8 cents. Messrs. Kerr and Fitzgerald also bought some quantities of cheese at the same price, while the rest sold at 9 13-16 cents. All the cheese except Stoney Lake, was sold, that factory remaining unsold.

Mr. Kerr at the same price, bought Keene, Central Smith, Missing Link. He offered 10 13-16 for further selections, and called Cedarvale, Mount Pleasant, Peterboro, Ballyduff, Daisy D. Young's Point, North Dunmer, Otonabee Union, South Burleigh.

Mr. Whittou bought Crown at the same price.

The Board then adjourned for three weeks.
