## Methodist Excursion.

The Nineteen Hundred and Sixty-Seven  
Outing a Grand Success.

The Methodist Sabbath School Held Their Annual Excursion on Tuesday Last.

It was a fine morning, and a seven-coach special train with a very pleasant crowd left Millbrook for Buckhorn on Tuesday at 7:30, carrying in the neighborhood of three hundred on board. We are sorry that a few "lates" (the inevitable will happen), were left, but time is up and the regular train is soon to follow, the road must be cleared, so away they go; a short stop is made at Frazerville and a coach load taken on, and away to Peterborough, while the ticket agents on board are very busy, but they are a good natured and agreeable lot from East Cavan and Monaghan, so that is soon over and the City is reached by 8 a.m.; here, through a misunderstanding, some friends are left, for which the Committee of Management are very sorry. On to Lakefield which lively town is reached, and in an hour and five minutes all told after leaving Millbrook the jolly crowd's arrival on the river, pretty quick work was it not? but none too soon to suit the holiday crowd. "A very pleasant sail," says one, "Ain't it great," says another, and for answer, "Well, I guess."

Katchawanoonka means "Lake of the Rapids" in Indian. Young's Point and the inevitable locks are soon passed, then through Clear and Stony Lakes. By the way, it is generally known that Ministers (Cabinet) come to spend the summer here all the way from Porto Rico? Well, such is the case.

On reaching Burleigh Wharf, the crowd were mostly hungry, and you should have seen them eat! There was a farmer from the south west of Millbrook, (no great physical dimensions), who managed to dine about half a dozen times at least, so it is reported, and he came home, well! The boat allowed most of the crowd a walk across the point and get a view of the fine fall, where a water power of great value might be, and will eventually be, utilized in the not distant future. The double locks lifts the boat in the neighborhood of thirty feet. Here also a fine new hotel has been built for the tourist trade. Huckleberry bushes were in sight, but no berries; and you did not see any. A few minutes after 12 "All Aboard" was shouted, and away we sailed, through Love Sick Lake and Lock, a lift of some 5 or 6 feet, but if appearances count for anything some on board got a bigger lift than that; well, why should not the lonely hearts be cherished while the days are going by? On through Deer Lake, passing Squaw River on the right, where we saw indications of lumbermen at work, "with wood to burn" well stored for next winter.

Up Buckhorn River to Buckhorn Locks; (who has run against the side of the Canal that no much of it is broken down?) After an hour's walk we return, calling at Mt. Julian for supper. Here all agree that they got "just the prettiest place for tea," scattered all around.

As an extra pleasure for the happy crowd the boat took them to Roschink, at the head of the lake, which is said to be about the prettiest spot on these waters.

Then Eastward, coming around to Young's Point at 7 p.m., and Lakefield is soon reached; some are tired, for they have had a long day, but the whistle blows, and the call "All aboard" is given, and we reach Peterboro at 8:30, Frazerville at 8:45 and Millbrook at 9 p.m. "What a splendid day," and "I ain't a bit tired, are you?" is asked by the young, while the older ones are glad they are home. But a fine moonlight night for a walk and a drive and all are home safe. The band added much to the enjoyment of the excursionists by giving several well rendered selections.

Much credit is due to Mr. R. W. Clarke, the efficient Superintendent of the Sabbath School, for the delightful trouble of these excursions fall on a few, and we all know of the great interest Mr. Clarke takes in anything he has to do with, and even when it means a sacrifice of his own time and money. When he puts his shoulder to the wheel it has to go, and Tuesday's excursion proves this assertion once more. We cannot let this write up close without acknowledging the kindly greeting given to all by Rev. G. R. Clark, the pastor of the Church, and for his efforts to help all enjoy themselves.

## Healey Falls Lease Secured by the Northumberland-Durham Power Co.

MR. CULVERWELL SUCCEEDS.

ORGANIZATION MEETING.

The final organization meeting of the Northumberland-Durham Power Co., Ltd., was held in the Council Chamber at Cobourg on Tuesday. The meeting was attended by some thirty-five of the leading men of the United Counties. Mr. J. A. Culverwell, the organizer of the company, announced at the meeting that the company has received a thirty years' lease of the Healey Falls, including both sides and the whole bed of the river and also the whole of the lower rapids. He also referred to the fact that the company also owned portions of the upper rapids, the remainder of the upper rapids being the property of the Dominion Government, which had purchased them some thirty years ago from private parties for lumber crib sliding purposes, for which purpose they are no longer used. The company expect to obtain the portion of the upper rapids now held by the Dominion Government, but it is advised by a prominent firm of consulting engineers that the company at present is able to develop a water power of 35 feet head of the whole river, which is estimated at 4,400 horse power in the dry season. The lease was issued at request of twelve municipal councils of the United Counties. Mr. Culverwell also showed that an eager market for this power already exists in Cobourg, Port Hope, Coburne, Brighton and other places in the United Counties and that estimates of engineers of the cost of development and delivering of power and light to the district showed that it could be supplied at cheap rates which would be profitable to both users and stockholders.

## OFFICIALS ELECTED.

The meeting lasted from eleven o'clock in the morning until six in the evening and details of organization were carefully considered. A board of eighteen directors consisting of representative business and manufacturing men of the district was elected. The directors and officials elected are as follows:

Donnelly, capitalist, Pittsburg and Cobourg; Robert Snelinger, apple exporter, Colborne; Col. Wm. McLean, 1st Counties ex-Warden, Port Hope; Saml. Purser, farmer, Port Hope; and T. C. Lapp, M.D.; W. J. Maher, cattle exporter; A. R. Dundas, merchant, T. R. Lapp, publisher; B. McAllister, councillor, all of Cobourg.

The immediate development of the property was decided upon and a leading firm of engineers in Toronto has been engaged to complete the plans necessary before calling for tenders. It was stated that the development of the power can be completed in about six months. The head office of the company is at Cobourg, as is stipulated in the company's charter, and all communications for the company may be addressed to the managing director—Cobourg World, July 28.

## The Entrance Examinations.

The examinations have this year been exceptionally difficult, and it is possible that there will be a large percentage of failures throughout the province. Though the questions set had all the merit of being clear, concise and pointed, and capable of being answered definitely and adequately, the paper in literature being specially good, still far beyond the Entrance Standard as gauged by the papers set in previous years. A candidate who successfully passes the sixty per cent standard this year in grammar and arithmetic has all the knowledge of these subjects for practical use. To put it in another way, the papers for entering the High Schools this year in these subjects are almost as difficult as those set last year for admission to the University. The Entrance Examination is not a final, but a preliminary examination and this fact should have been kept in mind by the examiners.
