WEDDING BELLS.

The Bride a Neice of Mr. W. H. Curry, Merchant, Omeme, where She Has Many Friends.

St. Paul's Church, Minden, presented a very pretty appearance on Wednesday morning last, on the occasion of the marriage of Miss Alice Stewart Curry, daughter of the late Charles D. Johnston, of Scarborough. The sacred edifice was filled to overflowing with a very happy gathering of friends of the contracting parties, and was very handsomely decorated for the occasion; the front pews were occupied by the relatives of the bride and invited guests. Mr. Jack Noyce and Mr. Sam Welch acted as ushers and discharged their duties very efficiently. Miss Edith M. Curry, of Omeme, presided at the organ in a very able manner.

The bride was escorted to the church by her mother, Mrs. C. D. Curry; her sister, Miss Isabel Curry, who discharged the important office of maid of honor; her uncle, Mr. W. H. Curry, of Omeme, who gave the bride away; and her brother, Mr. W. S. Curry.

Promptly at the appointed hour the bride, looking most charming, entered the church leaning on the arm of her uncle who escorted her to the chancel where the groom had already placed himself, supported by his brother, Mr. Charles Johnston, of Toronto, in the capacity of groomsmen, with the Rev. W. H. Baynes Rees inside the chancel awaiting the bride. As the bride and her attendants entered the church, the organ pealed forth the Wedding March and on her arrival at the chancel the marriage ceremony at once commenced; this being completed, the happy young couple being declared man and wife, they proceeded to the vestry with the officiating clergyman and the official witnesses, where the marriage was registered and the signatures attached to the official documents. While this was being accomplished the assembled guests in the body of the church were gratified by a vocal solo, "Love, Perfect Love," beautifully rendered by Miss Kimpton, accompanied by Miss E. M. Curry at the organ.

The bride and the assembled guests then repaired to "Ingleside," the residence of the bride's mother, where a most sumptuous wedding breakfast had been prepared, to which over fifty relatives and guests sat down. The tables were handsomely decorated with the bride's cake, a very handsome one, forming the central decoration on the table, opposite to which the bride and groom sat supported by the bridesmaid and groomsmen and directly opposite them Mrs. Curry, the bride's mother, was seated, supported by her brother-in-law, Mr. W. H. Curry. The gastronomic exercise having been completed with apparent satisfaction to all, the bride's health was then proposed in fitting terms by Mr. Delamere and rapturously received by the assembled guests, being responded to by the groom in a brief but very enthusiastic speech. The health of the bride's mother and the bridesmaid and groom's man were also enthusiastically given and was responded to by Mr. Charles Johnston, the latter gentleman, assisted by the maid of honor, then cut the "bride's cake," which was passed around to all the guests and declared to be "exquisite."

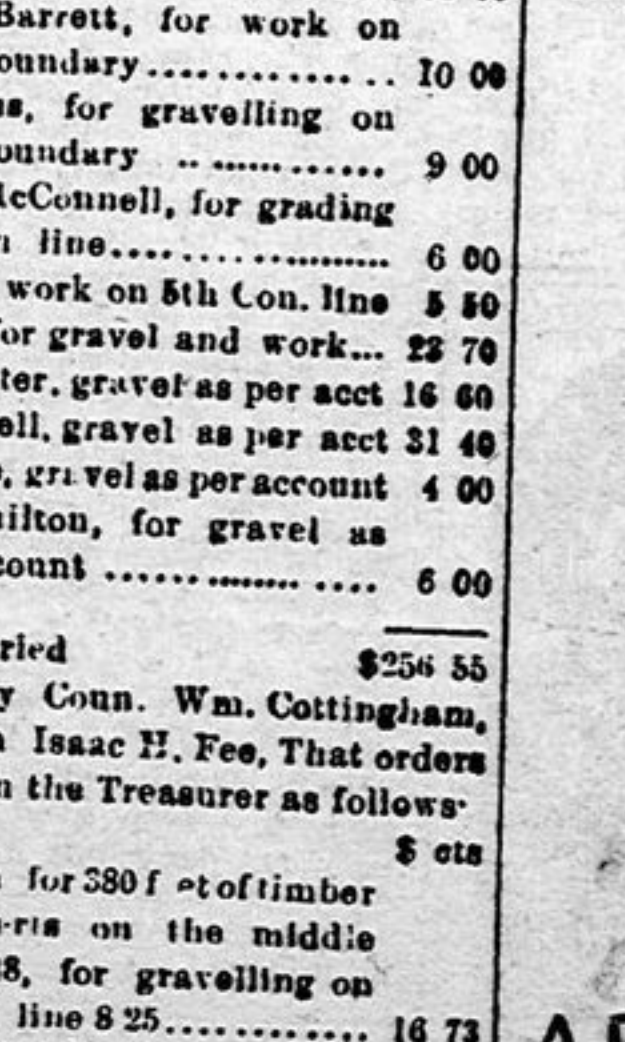
