

London's financial circles. "It has been admitted for some time past," said an eminent banker, to the London Daily Mirror, "and no one is more alive to the fact than the Bank of England itself, that there ought to be more gold in reserve than there is at present in the vaults.

"The Bank of England is the bankers' bank, and all the joint stock banks keep accounts with it. Therefore, it is the last resort in the matter of reserve in this country. In addition to this. London is the financial centre of the world, and anything that causes an unfor any great crisis should be removed. "At the present time there is about £37,000,000 of gold and bullion in the vaults of Bank of England-that is a weight of about 300 tons. 


