Electors are called upon to examine the said list, and if any omissions or any other errors are found therein, to take immediate proceedings to have the said errors corrected according to law.

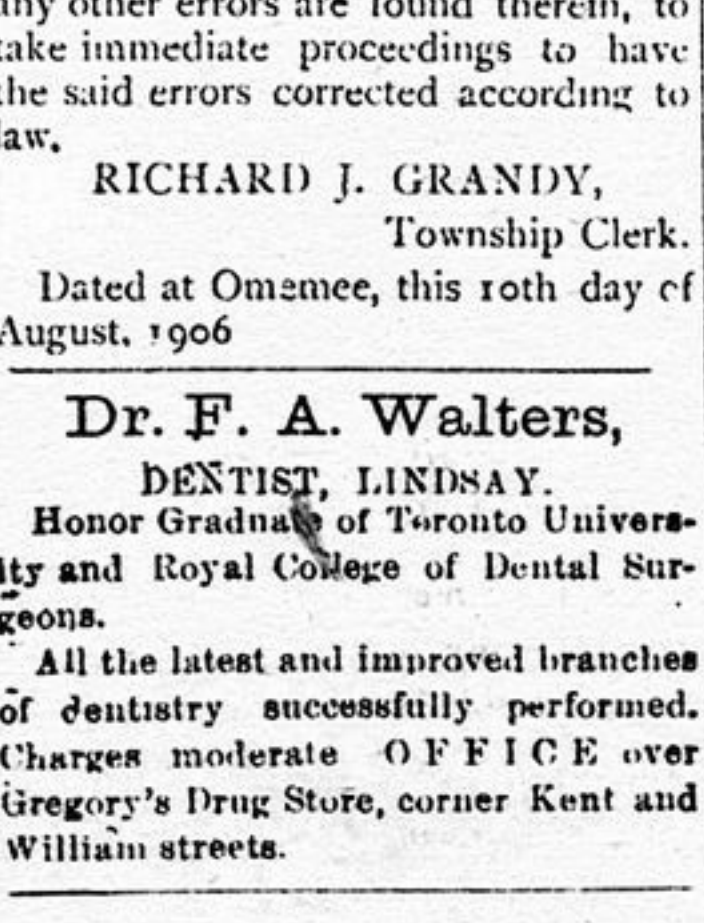

The Bobcaygeon Independent

has the following somewhat remarkable story: Some few weeks ago Mrs. D. Dain went to Omamee to visit her sister, Mrs. Dick. She had a collie dog, named Collie, about three years old, and as she expected to be away some little time, she requested that the dog be sent to her. Collie was accordingly placed in the baggage car of the train here, and went to Lindsay, where he was transferred to the Grand Trunk line, and sent to Omamee, chained in a baggage car. He left Bobcaygeon for the first time in his life on a Tuesday morning, and reached Omamee that day. Thursday morning when Mr. D. D. Cain opened his door, the first thing to greet him was Collie, wagging his tail, tired looking, but evidently much pleased to be home again. At first it was thought that he must have broken away from the car and jumped out, but at mid-day the mail brought a postcard from Omamee dated Wednesday afternoon announcing that the dog arrived safely, and at the time of writing was tied in the shed. There was then no doubt that the dog had made his way from Omamee across country somehow, among turnings of concessions and sidelines innumerable which he had never seen before. How did he start from Omamee in the first place, and how did he select the right turns? Was it merely a matter of instinct, or are you quite sure there was no reasoning power.

Good Report of an Omamee Boy.

On Sabbath, July 8, I held communion services in three country churches supplied by a seminary student, when we received into church membership fifty-two persons, all but four of them on profession of their faith, and thirty-four of whom we baptized. These persons were in age from 80 years down to 10. We also baptized 29 infant children of believing parents. The student had laid special stress upon the duty and privilege of infant baptism. This student is A. R. Evans, who has charge for the summer of the Elizabeth Rehoboth, Glenwood field. I am glad to commend the faithful, loving work of these young men whom God is already blessing richly in his work. They are all carrying the Gospel into homes of non-church going people, and by earnest, wise appeal, are doing a personal work, which God is blessing, as the fruit already gathered abundantly shows.

Young Mr. Evans has a wide field of four churches, and two other preaching points, but he is not content with preaching alone, but has visited every family within miles of the churches, and has won to Christ and the church many new families, reaching the old and young alike. On the fields of these young men in each church others will be reached ere the summer is ended, for with great tact and large enthusiasm, they are every day doing personal work. Preaching Christ from house to house, they are winning whole families to the church. What minister would not rejoice to see what came to young Evans so early in his ministry when within a single week over half a hundred persons of all ages united with his churches, and the parents of twenty-nine little ones stood with their children to covenant with God under that covenant so dear to our Presbyterial Church? After September we will place two ministers on this field, the churches giving 80 per cent more than ever before.

I do not favor student supply, i. e. churches depending on seminary students for preaching and pastoral work during the school year, but I do heartily approve of the kind of work these young men and others are doing, and what others like them have done in past summers in our synod. House-to-house visiting and loving and wise personal work are bringing to Christ and the church those that before seldom or never attended church services. Mere preaching, however able and scholarly, can not reach those not present to hear it. In our mission fields the men who are making a success of building up the churches and reaching the unevangelized are the men who are among the people doing personal work.—Rev. Geo. Knox, Synodical Superintendent, in Cincinnati & St. Louis Herald and Presbyter.
