TEMPERING OF STEEL.

modern tools requires very high temperatures, with absence of carbon, air and gases likely to alter the hot metal and to ensure exclusion of active chemical agents an improved electric tempering furnace has been constructed in Berlin. The steel is heated in a fused salt, barium chloride having proven most suitable. The furnace is a square box of iron, asbestos and firebricks and the interior is filled with salt and opposite iron plates serving as electrodes for the alternating current, the temperature being accurately controlled by a pyro meter and rheostats. In a chamber about 61/2 inches square and 7 inches deep a three pound piece of steel was heated to 1,300 degrees C. in 62 seconds. Working ten hours a day at the maximum of 1,300 degrees C., the furnace requires two pounds of barium chloride each day, a new lining once a year, and iron electrodes somewhat oftener. The fused sait scales off as the steel is plunged in the cooling liquid.
