Independent Order of Foresters.

HIGH COURT OF CENTRAL ONTARIO MEETS IN MIDLAND.

Large and Enthusiastic Meeting.

Best Year in History of Order—Hon. Elliott G. Stevenson, S. C. R., Royally Welcomed.

Barrister Cowan Elected High Chief Ranger.

The eleventh annual meeting of the High Court of Central Ontario, representing 256 Courts and 18000 members, met in the enterprising town of Midland on the 20th and 21st insts. Upwards of 300 delegates were present. It is to be remembered that Ontario alone has four High Courts, the Dominion 11, and the Order as a whole over 60.

Proceedings began promptly at 2 p. m. on the 20th Bro. Alex. Cowan, of Barrie, High Chief Ranger, presiding. The other High Officers, F. S. Meares, P. H. C. R.; T. Scott, H. V. C. R.; R. J. Niddrie, H. S.; Alex. Stewart, H. T.; A. L. Murphy, M. D. H. P., and A. A. Smith, H. C. Among past High Officers present were, Rev. Alex. MacGillivray, P. H. C. R.; David Millar, P. H. C. R.; J. A. V. Preston, P. H. C. R.; Dr. Mallory, H. T.; Mr. Frost, H. C.

The Supreme Court was represented by Hon. Elliott G. Stevenson, S. C. R.; R. Matheson, S. S.; W. H. Hunter, S. C., and Thos. Lawless, A. S. C. R.

The first order of business was the reception of the Supreme Court Officers, as Mr. Stephenson was obliged to leave to attend the High Court of Eastern Ontario that was in session at the same time.

The High Chief Ranger Bro. Cowan read the following address to the Supreme Chief Ranger:

THE HON. ELLIOTT G. STEVENSON,
SUPREME CHIEF RANGER,
Independent Order of Foresters.

DEAR SUPREME CHIEF AND BRO.: We rejoice at having you present with us at the Annual Communication of the High Court of Central Ontario, the Home Court of our beloved Order.

We extend to you a most hearty Forensic welcome on this your first visit. "Your worth is warrant for your welcome." As a citizen, a brother Forester and the First Executive Officer of the safest and best fraternal Society in the world, we recognize and acknowledge in you those qualities of head and heart that command our confidence and affection.

In you we recognize a worthy successor of the great Oroniyatekha for a quarter of a century the Master Builder of Independent Forestry, and whose loss you, perhaps even more than any of us, deplore. Among your claims on our respect and gratitude is your friendship for our departed leader and your splendid co-operation with him, lighting his duties and increasing his happiness by many invaluable services to the Order.

We commend the wisdom of our Supreme Executive in choosing you to occupy with such conspicuous ability and advantage to the Order.

We are glad of this opportunity to meet you personally and trust that your visit may be as pleasant to you as it is gratifying to us. Rest assured of our devotion to the "principals and aims" of Independent Forestry and count fully on our continued efforts to increase the membership of and thereby extend the blessing of our noble Order.

Accept our best wishes for your prosperity, health and happiness of your self and family. And, in closing, permit us to hope that for a quarter of a century we may hail you, too, as our beloved Chief.

In rising to reply the Supreme Chief Ranger was received with great enthusiasm, the whole High Court rising and cheering again and again. After feelingly acknowledging the warmth of his welcome, Bro. Stephenson said they were present to discuss frankly and fully questions of great moment to them all. Of the ability and worth of Dr. Oroniyatekha, no one knew better than he, as no one could deplore his death more. It would be his purpose and aim to build on the foundation he laid and make the order yet stronger and more secure.

Speaking of the investigations of the Royal Commission he said, "I am glad we had it and that more than twice as much time was given to the I. O. F. as any Insurance Company. All our securities, correspondence, records, &c., were carefully scrutinized. What was favorable to us was passed by; what could be criticised adversely was alone brought into the light. Credit

dit seemed to be claimed in the report of the Commission by the Insurance Department for suggesting some changes in the management and curtailment of the I. O. F. He wished it distinctly understood that long before the Insurance Commission was heard of, it had been decided, mainly on his initiative, to reduce strictly limit the operations of the Union Trust to transactions in authorized Trust Securities and withdraw from all transactions of a speculative character, which they were able to do at a profit of hundreds of thousands of dollars to the Order. The Royal Commission's suggestion that legislation looking to bringing of the rates of all the members up to the level of the rates of the National Fraternal Congress, be enacted.

This may suggest to the Supreme Court the advisability of so revising the rates obtaining prior to 1898, as to bring these into harmony with those then adopted for all new members. An Actuary and Staff were now employed collecting data on which to base safe conclusions. He would suggest to the High Court that in co-operation with the three other High Courts of Ontario they name an Actuary, who would see that the interests of the members in Ontario were being safeguarded in whatever action might be taken. Above all things they wanted the strength and permanency of the I. O. F. assured beyond peradventure and the benefits of the Order be yet more widely extended.

He was glad of this early opportunity of meeting with them. He gave them his confidence, in return he wanted theirs, there was nothing to conceal; only by cordial, earnest co-operation could the great work before them be successfully carried on. Bro. Stephenson was heartily thanked for his address and amidst ringing cheers he left to be present at the meeting of the High Court of Eastern Ontario that was meeting at the same time in Ottawa. Bro. R. O. Matheson, M. A., Supreme Secretary and Bro. W. H. Hunter, Supreme Councillor, were both present. It being their first appearance since their appointment to their important offices, both were presented with addresses to which they made suitable replies.

The report of High Chief Ranger Cowan was full of interesting facts. The membership in Central Ontario is 17,449, a net gain of 1574 in the year. The deaths were 140.

In the Order as a whole, are 255,623 members. The net increase for the past six months is \$887. The total benefits paid in the history of the Order are \$3,007,429.59. The surplus which now stands at \$10,086,564.65 more used during the past twelve months by \$1,174,521.67.

The reports of the Secretary, Treasurer, Auditors and various committees were all found to be highly satisfactory. The Treasurer's report showed a handsome balance.

The work of Organizer George A. Mitchell received deserved praise. It is the intention to put another Organizer in the field. New members are the very life of the Order.

An address of welcome from the Mayor, who was accompanied by Wm. Bennett, M. P., and a number of members of the Council, was presented. Rev. A. McGillivray, P. H. C. R., replied. An address of welcome from the local Court was presented by Bro. Parkhill, C. R., and replied to by Rev. Bro. French, N. O.

Measurings were decided upon as the next place of meeting. A suitable date in August was left to be chosen by the High Committee.

On the afternoon of Wednesday the delegates were entertained by the local Court to a delightful sail on the lake. The following delegates were elected to the next meeting of the Supreme Court:

The officers were duly installed by Bro. Thos. Lawless, A. S. C. R. The customary votes of thanks were passed. A very cordial one to the local Court for its many courtesies.

A very harmonious and successful session was closed at 10 p. m., with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne."

Bros. S. W. Clarke and A. A. Smith represented the local Court.

The Court at Bethany was represented by Bro. H. H. Ryley.

Messrs. Percy Handley, Alex. Clark, Harold Nattrass, Willie Sanderson and H. I. Griffin engaged Mr. L. Larner's handsome survey and one of his good teams and drove to Peterboro on Sunday last, where they were guests of Mr. S. Perry, an old Millbrook boy.

TENDERS addressed to the undersigned and endorsed "Tender for Dredging at Port Hope," will be received up to and including Saturday, August 31st, 1907, for dredging required at Port Hope, Durham County, Ont.

Combined specification and form of tender can be obtained at the Department of Public Works, Ottawa. Tenders must include the plant to be used from the works. Only dredges can be employed which are registered in Canada at the time of the filing of tenders. Contractors must be ready to begin work within thirty days after the date they have been notified of the acceptance of their tender.

Tenders will not be considered unless made on the printed form supplied, and signed with the actual signatures of tenders.

An accepted cheque on a chartered bank, payable to the order of the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, for one thousand dollars, (\$1,000), must accompany each tender as security deposit in connection with the dredging to be performed.
