**Howard Mallory**  
**Was Drowned.**

A Former Resident of Millbrook  
Lies in His Little White  
in Bathing.

**Frederick Miles, Makes Herculean Efforts to Rescue Companion and Nearly Loses His Own Life. Forced Below Water Three Times by Death Grip of Unfortunate Man.**

The Peterboro Examiner of July 30, says: "Details of the sad drowning accident at Stony Lake yesterday in which Howard Mallory was the unfortunate victim, bring prominently into the spotlight a heroic personage, Mr. Fred Miles. The latter along with Messrs Wood, Clarence Pickard and Harold Gray, were the companions of young Mallory at the lake. They had only gone towards the end of last week to spend a few holidays away from their daily grind in Peterborough and were passing a pleasant time.

On Monday night they all went up to Crow's Landing and participated in the programme. The following morning they went up the lake in each of their berries and on their return to Lee's Island at Beechink, all went in bathing.

The customary swim was between two islands not more than a hundred yards distant. Mallory was the one to ask in which manner he would enter the water. Some person said, 'Any way at all,' and a couple of the boys dived off the shore while others immediately struck out across the narrow passage.

Both Wood and Pickard were strong swimmers and they were a considerable distance in a matter of the remaining trip.

"Come a d help me," was the startling call that soon reached Miles' ears and on turning he saw to his dismay that his friend was in danger of losing his life. Swimming back to his aid as rapidly as possible Miles grabbed the unfortunate young man by the hair of the head and struck off for shore. But the latter had evidently received a sudden shock, possibly from swallowing a mouthful of water, and as usual with drowning men, seized his rescuer with a death grip about the neck and he struggling two went beneath the surface. On lifting Miles was able to shake off the grip and once again made an effort to take his companion to the island. A second time he was forced below. Wrestling himself free in the bottom of the lake Miles alone rose to the surface and in a semi-conscious state was dragged to shore by the others who had by this time come to the rescue. In a few moments the gasping and choking man, who had fainted as he was once more jumbled into the lake in search of his oestrine but his efforts were unavailing.

The canoe was then brought to the scene of the drowning and with the aid of the flippers, the body was located. Miles, headfirst, went down the line pole but he could not extricate it so tightly had it been wedged in among the rocks. On his second descent, however, he secured the body and soon the young man was being brought through the water to the shore. Miles' foot had been badly cut in the excitement and with the sight and loss of blood he fainted away on the rocks.

The deceased young man was a member of the George St. Methodist Church and had a host of friends in the city who will be much grieved to learn of his accidental death while so young in years.

Howard Mallory was only twenty years of age, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Mallory, 584 Park St. He has one brother, about 13 years of age, who was holidaying at Port Hope when the news of the accident reached him. The unfortunate young man was an employee of the C. G. E., and, as stated above, was widely and most favourably known in the city. His untimely death came as a sudden shock to his parents, who are stricken with grief.

Mr. George Lock of Millbrook, is an uncle of deceased, Mrs. Mallory being a sister of Mr. Lock. The Mirror joins in extending sympathy to the bereaved relatives and especially to the parents, who are heartbroken by the loss of their loved one.
