Presentation and Address.
MR. HERBERT I. LARMER HONORED BY FRIENDS.

May Now Attend Normal Schools
Examination Takes the Place of Former Junior Teachers' Test and is Written Upon in Nearly Every Portion of the Province—Marks and Certificates to be Sent Out.

The list of students who passed the recent examinations for entrance to the Normal schools was announced by the Department of Education last night. This examination was written upon in almost every portion of the Province. It takes the place of the former junior teachers' examinations, and is the academic test for fitness for second-class teachers' certificates. About August 17 the certificates of those who passed and the marks of those who failed will be mailed to the public school inspectors and high school principals.
