FARM WORTH \$2,000,000

GEORGE VANDERBILT'S MAGNIFICENT ESTATE.

"Book Farmer" From Louisiana Has Charge of the Fields, Flocks and Herds.

At Biltmore, in North Carolina, George W. Vanderbilt has spent over \$2,000,000 in creating the greatest estate in America. He has torn down a mountain, built a great castle, and owns 17 square miles of mountain country. These miles, however, are all under the most careful cultivation, either as farming, grazing or timber lands. The owner of Biltmore has the faculty of picking the right man for the right work. BUSINESSLIKE BIDDIES.

So the bare hills became pastures and lots for the swine to range, ample shelters being of course provided. The poultry farm was stocked with record egg-layers of high degree, also pigeons, for squabs are profitable. Modern incubators hatched chickens by the hundreds. Everything, however, was conducted on strictly business lines. Each Jersey has her own stall and a page in the dairy record. Every time she is milked the number of quarts she gives are marked on the record, as is also the butter test—the quantity of butter which the cream would make. All the ensilage and other fodder she eats in a day are debited against her. When a hen in the poultry house wants to contribute to the egg fund she is shut a gate which keeps her a prisoner until the poultry keeper finds her. He looks at the number of the leather band around her neck, takes the egg, and then releases her. Each hen also has a record page according to her number, and the number of eggs she lays in a month or year of her life are noted on the books at the farm office.
