The use of finger-prints as a means of identification has been known for uncounted ages. The origin of the practice is lost amid the shadows of receding years. JAPS AS FINANCIERS.

The Remarkable Showing Which They Have Made.

Had it been asserted eighteen months ago that Japan would be able, in an emergency, to raise a war of \$787,000,000 for the purpose of waging warfare against a European nation, the statement would have been given little credence, yet this is the remarkable showing made by the nation. Not only that, but the loan extended abroad have been on terms which bespeak the confidence of the world in the Mikado's people and their resources. The initial foreign loans of \$11,000,000 which Japan was required to pay 6 per cent interest and pledged the Customs duties of the country, have since been advanced. Japan again found it necessary to borrow on the 1st of March the tide of battle had turned in her favor to a degree that made the placing of \$150,000,000 at 4 1/2 per cent, a matter that was the negotiating of the earlier loans at a much higher rate. The recent loan of another \$150,000,000 was likewise arranged on a similar basis without the slightest trouble. In both instances the tobacco monopoly being pledged to security for the interest. Besides abroad, it has raised by Exchequer bonds at home since the beginning of the war \$190,000,000, the last instalment being subscribed by the patriotic Japanese to the extent of \$500 per cent. Increased economies have added \$106,300,000, 200,000; transfers from special accounts, \$31,500,000, and from other sources more than \$1,000,000,000, totaling a total amount raised for the prosecution of the war against Russia up to \$787,000,000.

ADMITTED IN LONDON.

The Home Office revised its method of identifying criminals. Here was something simpler and more certain than the Bertillon anthropometric methods. A new department was opened at the Registry of Habitual Criminals at Scotland Yard. The fingerprints of all prisoners convicted for certain classes of crime were to be taken before they quitted the respective jails and sent to Scotland Yard, where they would be examined, classified, indexed, and filed.

How has the system worked during the thirteen years of "trial"? Last year five thousand identifications were made by its instrumentality. The figures this year will probably be more than double. "In no single instance," said Inspector Collins, "was the result challenged. The fingerprint system has robbed the alias of its utility; the man of many names and many crimes has no longer successfully played his double game, and a first offence. His fingerprint betray him."

But, in addition, dangerous criminals have been identified.
