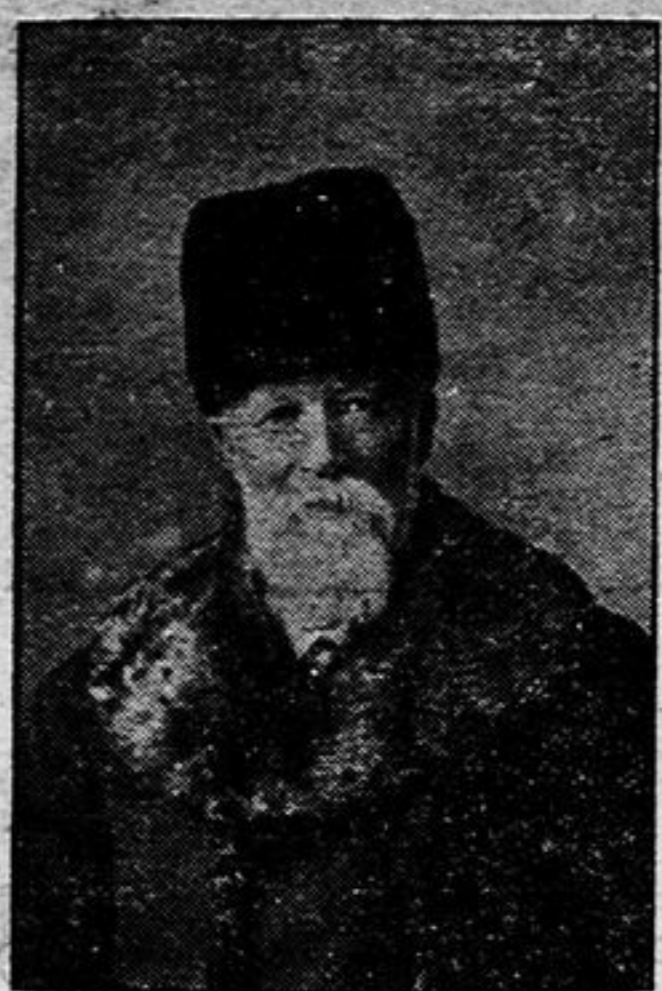
The highest market price for wheat is being paid at both mills, in fact at present owing to scant delivery more than the market price is being paid.
