Organ Recital.

A large and appreciative audience filled the Methodist church on Monday night, 16th inst., when the new pipe organ was formally opened. Mr. Bowles, of Toronto, proved himself to be a master of his instrument, and delighted the audience with his selections, which showed the variety of effects to be obtained from the new organ. From the faintest whispers of its soft stops, to the loud crescendo of the full organ every contrast of tone and power was given. Mr. Bowles had to respond to several recalls.

Mrs. J. C. Eaton, and Mr. Arthur Blight have been heard often in the church, but never to better advantage than on Monday night.

Miss Mabel Paen, of Toronto, is the possessor of a beautiful soprano voice, which was heard for the first time. She made a splendid impression. All the artists were recalled.

The choir sang two anthems in a finished manner, Mrs. Eaton taking the solo in "Oh, that I had wings like a dove," and Mr. Blight and Miss Paen the solos in "Seek ye the Lord."

The organ is a gift to the church from Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Eaton and their little son Timothy. It has two Manuals, tubular pneumatic action, and the motive power is electric. It is finished in quartered oak, and the pipes are tinted to match the decorations of the church.

The interior of the church has been newly decorated, the new metal ceiling in two shades of cream, while the walls are a pleasing shade of green with frieze and dado of deep crimson—the wood work being also of dark crimson.

With the new heating and lighting installed two years ago, and the recent improvement the church is quite comfortable and presents a very attractive appearance.

Between the first and second parts of the program the Rev. Mr. McCulloch, pastor of the church, in a few appropriate words asked the Trustees of the church to come forward, and called on Mr. G. A. Balfour, its representative to make a speech. Mr. Balfour spoke as follows:

Mr. Chairman and Christian friends, it is scarcely necessary for me to explain to you the object of our meeting to-night, as a trustee I am here with my brethren the other trustees, in a public capacity, to acknowledge on behalf of the membership of the church and congregation the gift of this beautiful Pipe Organ, as I read the inscription upon the place and there learned the motive which prompted the gift, I thought of the long life of usefulness to come to the church and to the community, I thought of the Providence that surrounded this gift, and I thought of the Scriptural promise which says "The fear of the Lord prolongeth days." I am sure it must be gratifying to our aged Brother and Sister to feel that in the evening of life they are surrounded by kind children, anxious to smooth the pathway of life and bestow every needed comfort, and I can assure them that as they have climbed to the top of the hill and are going down upon the other side that the prayer of the church which they stand identified is, that their last days may be their brightest days, their last joys their purest joys and their last comforts the sweetest comforts. It must also be very gratifying to those particularly concerned, and an action worthy the praise of all when the heart delights to rear some monument to perpetuate the memory of those whom they love and cherish.

We see in this gift an example of affection to father and mother, an attachment to the place of birth, a kind remembrance of youthful associates, and a loyalty to the church of choice, when the best learned to treat the name of Jesus. I trust that these few remarks which have been prompted by the necessities of the occasion, together with the address which I am about to read, may in some measure express to the gratitude of this congregation.
