### CAVAN COUNCIL.

Council Chamber, Cavan,  
Monday Oct. 23, 1905  
The Council met at 11 o'clock a.m. this day, pursuant to adjournment. Members all present. The Reeve presiding.

The minutes of the last meeting were read, approved and signed. The following communications were read:

- From Department of Public Works, Toronto, respecting re Long Swamp Drainage Works.
- From Canada Law Book Co., Toronto, respecting a book on the law of assessment.
- From Counties Clerk respecting Treasurer's sale of land for taxes on the 3rd day of January, 1906.
- From Wm. C. Brent, Toronto, respecting purchasing Deputies.
- From the Clerk of the Peace, Cobourg, acknowledging receipt of names of jurors for 1906, within prescribed time.
- From Minister of Agriculture, Toronto, respecting a recent bill about the future members of the Counties Council.
- Communications were left on the table.

The Reeve reported that the filing in and piping at Stanton's bridge was completed, and that Elison reported to him respecting an indictment at his place and requested the Reeve to take some steps respecting him. Elison spoke about purchasing some pieces of cedar belonging to the Township at Mitchell's mill, and he instructed him to see the Clerk about them.

Conn. Shaw reported that Collectors' securities were all right, and that the lot of filling in a washout opposite H. Neils, w. quarter line con. 1, for \$6.00 to D. J. Armstrong, and a job of gravelling to Chas. Lunn of 30 yards on con. 4 lot 1, for \$16.00, and he also instructed Fred Brown to let water off M. E. Mead's Mill.

Conn. Kelly reported that he and Conn. ### Very Sudden Death.

**Mr. George Campbell Passes Away Without a Moment's Warning. - Was Most Highly Respected.**

About noon on Sunday the 29th day of October the people of Millbrook were startled to hear of the sudden death of Mr. George Campbell, which took place at his residence about one mile south of the village on that day. He rose in the morning to all appearance as well as usual and saw that everything was attended to, about 10 o'clock a.m. he got out a horse and buggy for Mrs. Campbell and her sister Mrs. Fee to drive to church, and then went into the house and lay down on a sofa reading a book. This eldest son of Mr. Thos. A. Campbell sat about four feet from him also reading. About twenty or twenty-five minutes later without explanation or alarm of any kind he fell off the sofa, his son instantly sprang to his assistance to hear but the faintest gasp and Mr. Campbell passed beyond human aid. His death was due to heart failure, swift, sudden and painless.

Mr. Campbell was born in the township of Hope in 1844 on the family homestead now owned by his brother Thomas, and settled in Cavan when 15 years of age on the farm he has since owned and occupied up to the time of his death. For years he found exercise for brain and muscle in clearing, improving and cultivating his land, witnessing and sharing in the evolution of harvest machinery from the cradle and rake to the reaper and self-binder. With the advent of labor-saving machinery Mr. Campbell found himself able to devote more time to matters of public concern to which he always gave intelligent interest, and in 1876 he was elected Deputy Reeve of Cavan, Reeve in 1880 and Warden of the Counties in 1885, retiring from municipal life at the expiration of his term as Warden. Recognized as a safe steady man, reliable and of more than average business ability, he had no difficulty in retaining the confidence of the people of Cavan and made many warm personal friends among his colleagues of the Counties Council. He was returned to the Legislature in 1891 as Member for East Durham, but failed to secure re-election in '94 being defeated by the late W. A. Fallis. Mr. Campbell had been School Trustee for many years and filled that office and was Treasurer of Cavan at the time of his death. In 1879 he married Margaret Walsh, daughter of the late William Walsh of the Falls Line, Cavan, who survives him. To this union were born five children three of whom are living.

Mr. Campbell was a successful farmer and brought to his work on the farm and elsewhere steady determination, great energy, a clear head and intelligent appreciation of what he had to do. He was straight and honest in his dealings, truthful in word and action, fair and honorable in the different relations of life. By all his friends and neighbors he will be greatly missed, his wife and family who knew and loved him best can but look to the great Father of all for consolation in their heavy trouble.

He leaves to mourn his loss a wife, two sons, Thomas A. at home, G. Arthur a student at the University and a daughter, Margaret at home. His mother, relict of the late Thomas Campbell residing in Hope, three brothers, John near Peterboro, Thomas in Hope, William general merchant, Campbell's, and five sisters, Mrs. McMurtry and Mrs. G. Patterson, Pert Hope, Mrs. Hanna, Midland, Mrs. Robt Woods, Cavan and Miss Maria at home in Hope, also survive him.

The funeral took place on Tuesday from the family residence to St. Paul's Cemetery, Cavan, and was very largely attended.

Many beautiful wreaths were placed on the casket, among them one from Home and Mother, Pillow from Millbrook Public School Board, Compass and Square from Cavan Council, Wreath from Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Foster, and Floral Offering from the Teachers of the Millbrook School. The funeral was conducted by J. B. Hall, Lodge A.F. & A.M., and the Independent Order of Foresters attended in a body to pay their last tribute of respect to a departed brother. Both Lodges marched to the cemetery to the solemn strains of the Dead March, played by the Millbrook Citizens Band. Rev. W. C. Allen assisted by the Rev. W. R. Spencer and Rev. Wm. Johnston conducted the impressive funeral services and when the church service was concluded, the Brethren of J. B. Hall Lodge formed round the grave. Dr. Montgomery, W.M. read the beautiful funeral service of the order and the Brethren gave the last honors in memory of the departed.

The pall bearers were members of J. B. Hall Lodge, viz: Dr. Clarke, Dr. Turner and Messrs. Harry Armstrong, A. Leach, J. C. Kells and A. A. Smith. General and wide spread sympathy is expressed for the family in their bereavement.

Quite a number were present at a very interesting missionary meeting of the Methodist Epworth League last Monday night, which was efficiently conducted by Miss Lillie Peck. Extracts and a letter bearing on the subject were read by Mrs. Walter Gillett and the Misses Stella Hetherington and Maud Nugent. It is to be hoped that all members will be careful not to either give or take offence too easily, but that due allowance and forbearance will be made to one another during the meetings, and in fact at all times.

### Death of Thos. Grandy

**Another Highly Respected Citizen Passes Away After a Lingered Illness.**

This week it is our regretful duty to chronicle the death of a widely known and respected citizen, who died at his residence here on Monday last. In May 1903 while in Bethany Mr. Thos. Grandy received a paralytic stroke and for a time his recovery was looked for, but his illness was so severe that he never recovered his former robust health. Last winter his condition became worse, he was again confined to his room never to leave it till the last of June. Born in Cavan he resided in the township most of his life, till he removed to Millbrook some twenty years ago, where he has resided since. His business as a cattle and live stock dealer brought him into intimate relations with the farmers of Cavan and surrounding townships and he retained their confidence and esteem through a long and honorable business career. An elder brother, Mr. Samuel Grandy lives to the north of Cavanville. He will feel the loss of his brother with the keenest sorrow, and like the deceased is esteemed and respected wherever known. Mr. Grandy passed away at the comparatively early age of 66 years; his death leaves a vacancy not easily filled, and his memory will be cherished by his friends and remain an incentive to square and honest endeavor.
