Son of Rev. Mr. Burgess Accidentally Shoots Himself.

While out with some comrades in the beginning of this week, Mr. Clifford Burgess, son of Rev. Mr. Burgess, Church of England clergyman at Bethany, accidentally shot himself.

Burgess, who is about 19 years of age, has been assisting the G.T.R. agent at Kinnmount for several months. Yesterday he joined several companions in a walk to Three Brothers Falls on the Burnt River, and one of the party having a rifle they began shooting at a mark. When young Burgess pressed the trigger no explosion occurred, and without thought he lowered the butt of the rifle to the ground and looked into the barrel. Just then the charge exploded, the bullet entering the left eye and emerging at the base of the brain.

Help was procured and the unfortunate young man carried to Kinnmount, where Dr. E. A. White was called in. He was afterwards removed to the Ross Hospital, Lindsay, where he passed away without regaining consciousness.

The funeral took place yesterday from the family residence, Bethany, to the Church of England Cemetery and was largely attended. The services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Spencer, of Millbrook, assisted by the Rev. J. H. Teney, Omeme. Both parents, a brother and sister survive. Mr. Burgess was a young man of good principle and great promise, and sympathy for the family is widespread and sincere.
