This is not true, we are merely making the increase in prices to meet the increased expenditure. Just here I will quote a few prices of work and material Thirty-five years ago compared with to-day.

Coal has advanced from \$1.50 to \$2 per ton and has not nearly the lasting qualities.

If Canadian Blacksmiths are not good enough to shoe Mr. Hassard's Horses and he has to buy a shop and import a man why does he interfere with us and our prices and try to force his man on the public. It must be because he would like to appear as a public benefactor and farmers friend. However Mr. Editor there are a few of them who do remember the old \$1,800 Syndicate Horse deal. I do not wish to take up space to answer Mr. Hassard's question, where common sense is not used it would indeed be hard to answer. I simply ask the men of this community to consider the prices we are asking and the prices we are asked to pay.
