What Local Option Does.

It is unwise to make extravagant statements or indulge in glowing prophecies as to the transcendent good that will result from the enactment of Local Option by-laws and thus abnormally raise the hopes and expectations of the people to a point so high that they will be disappointed in the actual results.

It is not claimed for Local Option that it will stop all legal drinking and prevent all drunkenness in the community. It is not claimed that it will absolutely prevent all law violations, nor is it to be expected that the best results of the law will be seen immediately after it has come into operation.

What Local Option will do is this: It will close the bar-room as an open public drinking place. It will destroy the treating system. It will make it easier for men to keep sober and hard for men to get drunk. It will benefit business by diverting the money now freely passing over the bar into channels of legitimate trade. It will lessen the consumption of liquor both in the bar-rooms and in the homes of the community. It will lessen drunkenness. It will make communities more orderly and peaceful. It will prove and purify the home-life.
