On Wednesday, Dec. 13th, the Girls Guild of Christ Church, Omemees, held its first bazaar, which although it was the first affair of the kind ever held here, was a decided success, not only financially but in every way.

The things offered for sale were chiefly small fancy articles suitable for Christmas gifts. The girls made all the pieces of fancy work within about a month and a half.

The church basement had been decorated for the occasion by willing workers and it was quite pleasing to the eye, upon entering. The ceiling was draped with red bunting which crossed and recrossed overhead and the walls and pillars were trimmed with wreaths of evergreens, while small flags were abundant everywhere.

There were three booths in operation all evening the largest of which was at the east side of the basement. It was decorated with large union-jacks, and white and red cloth. At this booth fancy work of every description was displayed, many pieces being quite handsome and the prices all so reasonable as to be within the most modest income.

In the next booth aprons of the specialty, aprons of every kind from dainty fancy ones to the larger aprons which are donned in the kitchen, were bought by enthusiastic customers every article being sold.

The third booth was very interesting judging from the crowd which was constantly about it. Here were sold dolls, woolen goods and magazines of all kinds, as well as pictures suitable for framing.

Perhaps the most pleasing feature to many of our patrons was the tea room. Tea was served from five o'clock until seven thirty. Miss Johnson poured the tea and the waitresses were most attentive, so that every one who took tea with us, heartily enjoyed it. The tea room was prettily arranged and looked quite festive with its red bell suspended from the ceiling and evergreens everywhere.

The girls considered their little attempt quite a success, although the proceeds are not definitely known as yet, it is thought that they amount to nearly forty five dollars.
