WARNS THE CUSTOMS. "After a few weeks the dealer sent the pictures to his correspondent in New York, and at the same time sent a letter to the customs authorities there, telling them that they were about to be the victims of a tremendous fraud. Two real Rembrandt pictures, recently discovered, were to arrive from Europe with the name of Rembrandt painted out and another insignificant name substituted for it. 'Take off the upper coat of paint in the right hand lower corner and you will find that the name of Rembrawd is there. The idea is to sell these aid masterpieces in the United States after they have passed your administration. I warn you that each painting is worth at least \$120,000.

PAYS THE DUTY. "This advice did not fall into uneager burning boots, scorched hands and ears. The outer coat was taken off, and sure enough, there was the name 'Rembrandt,' with the proper date. The customs people demanded \$25,000 for the two paintings, a sum paid contritely by the correspondent, who feigned great thankfulness for being let off for that amount. But a fortnight later he sold the pictures for nearly \$120,000, their authenticity being properly established by the receipts of the American custom house. They had cost \$20 apiece in


