Power Offer Made to Lake Front Towns is not a Bona-Fide One.

Mr. Culverwell Says the Proposition of Opposition Company is far From Genuine and Made Simply With View to Injure the Northumberland-Durham Power Co.

The following statement is handed to the Review for publication by Managing Director J. A. Culverwell, of the Northumberland-Durham Power Co. Ltd., lessees and owners of parts of Healey Rapids:

The Northumberland Paper and Electric Company, of Campbellford, has made an offer to the Hydro-Electric Commission (as published in the Ontario newspapers) to supply Bellefleur, Deverault and Kingston with power, the price, not including local wire or local distribution charges, Mr. Culverwell states that the bona fides of the offer are not substantial and cannot be made so, as that Company only owns about a quarter of Ranney Rapids at Campbellford, the upper similar portion of the rapids and lands, which control the development of the whole, being owned by himself and his associates.

It is an absolute fact that only some one thousand horse power is available for transmission by the said company, which is controlled by Cecil B. Smith, engineer, of Toronto, and of recent Winnipeg Council celebrity, and retired member of Hydro-Electric Commission, J. G. Kerry, who is Dominion Government Commissioner of Quebec Bridge disaster, and A. A. Mulholland, recently defeated Liberal candidate of East Northumberland. Associated with them in their Canal survey and water power manipulations are a Lakefield cement contractor, and also a retired canal engineer.

Mr. Culverwell states that this so-called "power offer" is evidently made for the purpose of further malicious damage to organization of the Northumberland-Durham Power Co., Ltd., a company endorsed officially by eighteen municipal councils, the directors being composed of the leading manufacturers and business men of the South Midland district.

Recently the Smith-Kerry Company endeavored, with the help of an assistant canal engineer at Campbellford, to induce the ratepayers there to pass into their control the "Middle Falls" power controlled and now being developed by the municipal by specific use there, but Mr. Culverwell exposed the deal and the ratepayers endorsed his efforts.

These same people have been blocking the Northumberland-Durham Power Company's efforts for two years to secure a lease from the Dominion Government for their intervening portion of Healey Rapids, the lower, large portion of which is held by lease from the Ontario Government by the company, which also owns portions of the upper rapids and patent for the lands for the lands required for development works, the power rates being regulated by the Ontario Government.

Mr. A. A. Mulholland himself, Hon. George Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals, for his recent defeat (the cause of his statesmanlike utterance at Campbellford before the election, that the canal would be completed whether Mr. Mulholland was elected or not), but the general feeling is that Mr.

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Mulholland's connection with the Smith-Kerry Company's canal water power manipulations caused his heavy defeat at Campbellford and Seymout township polls.

Mr. Culverwell states that he is sorry to find it essential to make these statements, but in view of the fact that his company (which is now developing Healey Rapids), has been municipally advised to stop work until they find out whether they can secure the Dominion Government intervening portions; and the canal surveys having delayed his company for over two years, he thinks that the company's enemies are endeavoring to bring it to ruin by delay. In fact one opponent has been heard to say that they will attempt to starve out the company by obstruction.

However, notwithstanding the character of the opposition and the general financial stringency, Mr. Culverwell states that the company has secured 25 new local stockholders, and besides New York capitalists have visited Healey Falls recently, and are satisfied with the proposition. They will return to Healey Falls next week.
